the fire every second year and looting out at every jump.

Just what the Department or anyone else can do with a class of people who insist in doing their own planning and thinking is a most difficult question, but may be worth while thinking out later.

Now we come to the No. 2 class of farmers, generally pretty good men, ready to take advice and willing to carry it out. They are not asking anyone to buy them a farm. They do not want something for nothing. But unfortunately they are many of them a bit behind. They are short of cash to carry on, and a man without the means to carry on is discouraged. He may want to buy a horse, or some other improved stock, perhaps some fertilizer. The Banks will not loan him money, unless some very well known man joins his note, and then it is only for three or six months at 7%, if you please.

By no stretch of the imagination can I arrive at the idea of any Government borrowing the rate of interest from the very people who are the backbone of this country.

Some one may ask why do farmers want to buy horses, why not raise them? We used to do so in former years, and such horses as P. E. Island did raise and can yet to do so. Echo answers why? That is that our farmers skinned in buying those car loads of Western horses. They may be and no doubt are O.K. in the climate that they are used to. But one or two years here in our climate, and their usefulness is done.

The Government has been advertising themselves, or others doing it for them, to induce people to borrow money under the Housing Plan scheme. Fancy coaxing people to borrow money to spend on their homes with the idea of giving employment. Now many people are in trouble over this. The Banks trying to collect money that they have loaned to borrow money, the farmer has to go on his knees to borrow fifty or \$100.00 to carry on his farming operations and pay 7% for the privilege.

I know a friend who has some money, and who very often helps someone who really wants to help himself. One evening a farmer dropped in to talk over farming operations. He spoke of buying a horse, a Western horse, as he could get these on notes. His friend advised him to buy an Island bred mare and breed her. That meant \$150.00, but he did it. The old farmer gave to his fourteen year old boy, other foals will follow, in due time. Talk about a good investment, that's what it is. I leave that to your imagination.

That is one help out of very many given by this man, whose pocket book is not as big as his heart. He is a man who will help, and who will and do help themselves if given a chance to do so.

There you are, Mr. Minister of Agriculture, mind your own vacant farms for the present, take in a few, if you have applications from the right kind of P. E. Island sons who know what to do, but hold on to what we have by doing some help to worthwhile No. 2 class of farmers who want small loans at a low rate of interest. They may buy better in the market, and eighteen months payments, and that money can keep on doing good by loaning to others, and last but not least, encourage our farmers to raise and raise their own horses, and stop this terrible rule of importing those Western ones into this province.

CREAM GRADING, DOG TAX ETC.

Sir - I notice in your issue of April 12th a letter signed by "Dairyman" and I might say I am very glad of this gentleman having placed this letter in the columns of your most valuable paper. It is always best that the facts should be known.

I might say that, at the meeting of the Dairyman's Association, was recommended that cream should be graded at the factories more particularly on account of the fact that they were in the market at the present time in the Maritime. Subsequently the Board of Directors of the Dairyman's Association asked the Department to strictly inspect the Cream Grading Act. New Brunswick is now rigidly inspecting their cream, and Nova Scotia has an Act on its statutes for the same purpose.

Our butter has not deteriorated insofar as workmanship is concerned but in flavor and that defect is brought about by inferior cream being used in the manufacture of butter. I presume, Sir that ninety per cent of our dairymen are supplying good sweet cream to the factories, and the other ten per cent sending in an inferior article which is lowering the quality and grade of our butter; so that the Department has decided that the Managers of the different creameries be to make a rigid grading of the cream which they accept at the factory this year for which no additional inspectors will be necessary. The Dairy Inspector will supervise this work and will see

Buy Millions In Arms From U. S.

WASHINGTON, April 12 - (AP) - Great Britain and France have obtained licences for the export of approximately \$25,000,000 worth of supplies from the United States in the first quarter of this year.

The State Department said today licenses had been issued for export to Great Britain in the amount of \$13,202,987 and to France for \$11,134,764.

The supplies consist almost entirely of airplanes.

Actual shipments run considerably under the licenses issued, totalling just over \$10,000,000 for the two countries. Britain so far this year has taken out of the United States \$5,368,238 worth of war materials and France \$4,667,460.

Japan disappeared entirely this month from the list of licensees.

pass any regulations that would in any way deal with the matter that is under their jurisdiction. I sometimes think that our farmers are too prone to buy their seeds from men who have no reputation for the quality of the seeds they sell, and while I deplore the facts as stated by "Dairyman", I regret to say that our Department has no jurisdiction over the matter.

In the third section of his letter, he refers to "Dogs" and "Dog Taxes". I may say that I have always believed it to be my duty in administering the affairs of the office, to do everything I could do to better the conditions of the people throughout the Province. The Dog Act provides that, if a party does not pay his taxes and is taken before the courts, he is fined ten dollars for not having paid his taxes. If he does not pay the fine of ten dollars, he is liable to a jail sentence of ten days. This is all on account of neglecting to pay one dollar due on his dog. It did seem to me that, if this Act was enforced, it would entail a great deal of hardship on a great many of our people and I hesitated to do so, hoping that the people would

see that they had a right to pay this Tax and that they would eventually pay it without making it necessary for the Department to resort to such drastic methods. If, however, the people continue to refrain from paying, we will be forced eventually to do this.
