THE YOUNG GIANT OF THE NORTH.

A strong article in Bradstreet's under the above caption shows the increasing importance attained by the Dominion in the eyes of our republican neighbors. Canadians are not very much given to trumpeting their achievements but are none the less willing to hear the trumpet blown by an alert bystander. The article in question reviews our financial, commercial and industrial development and gives a forecast of some future possibilities. Two years ago the total paid-up capital of Canadian banks was in round figures 66½ millions; now it is 70½ millions, and arrangements are being made for a still farther expansion of the banking capital of the country.

Canadian trade shows an aggregate of native exports and of imports entered for consumption of \$398,811,000, or an increase over 1896 of \$167,000,000. This is an increase equal to \$80 per head of our total population, which is said to exceed the growth shown in any similar period by any other country. In other words Canada has broken the world's record in the expansion of her commerce, and has been so busy with her trade and industries that she barely noticed the fact. But a watchful neighbor has taken note of it and recorded it to our credit. In the six years we increased our exports of Canadian products to Great Britain from 62 millions to 109 millions and also our exports to the United States from 34 millions to 68 millions.

Of course the development of our iron and steel industries, notably at Sydney and the Soo claim a place in the review of Canadian growth and progress. They are regarded by the writer as of prime importance, and demonstrate a great stride forward within a very recent period. The results achieved both in the east and west are noted to have made it clear that the experimental stage has been passed, and that Canada will in future take an important place among the iron and steel producing countries. What this may mean in the way of industrial and wealth-producing development only the future can fully disclose.

And then there is the development of our Northwest country as evidenced by the magnificent harvest of the present year. For the first time the grain grown in our prairie country has passed 100

million bushels, of which 60 million bushels was spring wheat of a higher average grade than the country ever produced before—in other words, the best wheat in the world. This year there were less than three million acres in wheat, and an idea of future possibilities is given by the statement that there are in that part of Canada 40 million to 50 million acres of land as good for the production of wheat as the area now under cultivation. This shows the easy possibility of our Northwest yet producing a wheat crop considerably in excess of that now produced in the United States.

From the above brief outline it will be seen that there are good reasons for speaking of Canada as "the young giant of the north." Our vast territorial area, our resources of coal, forest, mine and sea, our rapidly growing trade and multiplying and extending industries, all join to show how very real is the somewhat high-sounding phrase. Hitherto our greatest want has been the sparseness of our population. The people we have, have shown themselves "fit, though few" by having accomplished so much. And now has begun a really strong influx of people, notably from the United States, to our fertile unsettled lands. This fact gives assurance of still more rapidly increasing population, prosperity and wealth in the coming years.

Do not forget the deputation to wait upon the Government this afternoon in the interest of Prohibition. We have a good law given us by the Legislature. It will do great good if effectively put in operation. An active, reliable prosecutor and the hearty co-operation of the Provincial Government are immediate requisites to this end. This is a matter to be in earnest about, and all order-loving citizens should make their influence felt at this time. The opportunity now offers. Remember this afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Legislative Chamber.
