Promising to tell all, Mr. Slomp said McLean testified before Senator Walsh, Democratic, Montana, on the same day, that he had given Fall two cheques aggregating \$100,000 late in 1921, but that they had been returned to him un cashed. Today, however, the committee learned from an examination of the records of Washington banks that the publisher did not have an aggregate of \$100,000 on deposit at that time in the bank on which he said the cheques were drawn. Taking the oil discussion again to the floor of the Senate Senator Walsh charged that the Republican National committee news bureau had made a "deliberate and malicious" misrepresentation of the facts in its statement of yesterday that the naval oil leases were made under the general leasing act of Feb. 1920, which he had sponsored.

LITERARY LECTURE ENJOYED

The third of the series of literary lectures at Prince Street School was given last evening by Mr. D. Edgar Shaw, on "Some Reminiscences of the late Dr. Drummond." Mr. Rogers, Superintendent of Education, presided. An excellent musical programme was carried out by the school pupils of the school, who gave several pleasing songs and choruses. Mr. Shaw in his lecture described the late William Henry Drummond as the discoverer of the true spirit of the French Canadian people and stressed the point that it was the poetry of Drummond, such as "The Habitant, Johnnie Courteau and The Voyageur, which was mainly instrumental in cementing together the British and French elements in Canada. The lecturer read, for the entertainment of the children and the older people who were present, "The Wreck of the Julie Plant" and snatches from various poems in the French Canadian dialect to illustrate Drummond's manner of presenting the honest, upright simplicity of the French Canadian farmer; for as he said, "these portray to us their simple lives in such a way that we learn to appreciate and love them as Drummond did himself." The work of various contemporaries were cited, among them being the famous poem of E. W. Thomas, "Ottawa" written on Drummond's death. April 9th, 1907, and the beautiful poem "In Memory of William Henry Drummond" by a well-known American writer, S. Weir Mitchell. M. D. The quotation of this latter poem brought the address to a fitting close. A hearty vote of thanks, moved by Mr. Henry Smith, chairman of the School Board, which was seconded by enthusiastic applause from the children, was tendered the lecturer. The meeting closed with the National Anthem.

A SYDNEY VIEW OF ROBERTSON STEEL REPORT

"Marks End of One of Most Senseless, Expensive and Farcical Junketings," Says Post.

SYDNEY, Feb. 23.—(Sydney Post) Concerning the Robertson commission report on the Cape Breton steel industry, the Sydney Post says, editorially:

"An eminent historian has written of Charles the Second that nothing he had ever done in life became him half so well as his manner of leaving it. The Robertson Commission's report will give the most senseless, expensive, and farcical series of junketings ever carried on in this country, under Government authority, and at the public cost and charge.

The Commission, which consisted of Dr. J. W. Robertson, an agricultural expert, Fred Bancroft, a journalist, and J. J. Johnston, a political casualty, was appointed some time in late August or early September, to investigate the conditions which culminated in the Sydney steel strike of last July. These three gentlemen appear to have managed to stay on the country's payroll for approximately six months. They spent about one-sixth of that time in Sydney, and five-sixths of it travelling through Canada and the United States, in an itinerary in which they covered a mileage of which would take them half round the globe. During this series of tours, the chairman, in receipt of \$50 a day, and each of the other commissioners \$35 a day, with travelling and living allowances for themselves and their secretary which, with the other expenses incurred at the various stages of their peregrinations, must have amounted to approximately \$360 a day. The total cost of this research expedition to the people of Canada will run somewhere between \$40,000 and \$60,000. Its value to the country, on a generous estimate, will fall considerably below 30 cents.

"After assembling and digesting evidence" for about six months, the Commissioners find that the Sydney steel workers went on strike last summer for better wages, and to enforce recognition of their union; that preceding the strike relations between the workers and their employers were not satisfactory; that following the strike, there was rioting and violence; that the local
