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**Commission On Co-Ops Resumes Work At Halifax**

HALIFAX, March 6 (CP) - Clarification of existing income tax laws as they affect co-operatives was cited as important by A.S. MacIntyre of Antigonish, educational director of the Nova Scotia Co-operative Union, in giving evidence today before the Commission on taxation of co-operatives.

The union's brief was the only one submitted before the five-member commission under Mr. Justice Errol M.W. McDougall of Montreal, which opened its Halifax sittings here today. Questioning of Mr. MacIntyre and Neil MacDonald of Sydney Mills, president of the British Canadian Co-operative Society Limited, occupied the entire afternoon.

The Canadian organization is one of the 51 member co-operatives in the Provincial union, which was described as a non-trading federation of co-operatives which promotes educational and advisory work for members. It is closely connected with the extension department of St. Francis Xavier University at Antigonish, N.S.

The witness said clarification of tax laws was necessary so the co-operatives would know "just where they stand."

He agreed with commissioner B.N. Arnason of Saskatchewan that the portion of profits which accrued in trading with non-members of the co-operative might be taxed, but that member profits should remain exempt. He said the societies were formed for the benefit of "those who wanted to make their dollars go further; they weren't intended to amass profits."

He was asked by commissioner E.T. Parker, of Halifax, whether a co-operative like the British Canadian which operates nine stores in the Cape Breton mining fields, was a "chain store" system. He said that savings made by mass buying by chain stores provided further profits for the operator, while the co-operative stores turned their profits or savings back to the members.

He drew a reply by replying to chairman McDougall that the co-operative "wouldn't exclude even a millionaire, if he was honest in his desire to make his dollars go a little further in his purchases of necessities."

The Nova Scotia union is a branch of the National Co-operative Union, which will make combined representation to the commission on the tax question at a later date, so the Provincial union was making no special representation at this time.

The commission continues its sittings tomorrow and Wednesday.

**Life Easier In London But Not Luxurious Yet**

LONDON, March 6 (CP) - Life in London now—at least, that's what many Londoners have told me in the last few days—is almost like old times, they said.

Yet shortages and restrictions which I encountered in only one day in the city travel by air from London in Canada seemed so acute; so one of my friends made up a list of what she called "luxuries and privileges."

1. The names are back on the road and road signs are up again.

2. The church bells may be rung again.

3. There is more total blackout—just the "dim-out."

4. Automobiles and other vehicles may keep their lights on.

5. On the traffic signs the small lights have been replaced, leaving only half the light blocked out.

6. The ban on travel by the coast has been lifted in most places.

7. Heat and restaurant cars have been restored in some trains.

8. The Home Guard is disbanded.

Fire-watching duties for the ordinary citizen are relaxed.

"It's impossible to imagine what the things have meant to us," she said. "Just to be able to take a knapsack and go to the seaside for two weeks and take a chance on finding a room. It was heaven after five years. To get away from the whine of the doodle-bugs. We counted eight of them in five minutes once."

"As for fire-watching, can you imagine what it was to have to do your house yourself in the morning, then go to your job, then afterwards come home and take a turn at fire-watching? We feel quite rejuvenated since that has gone off."

"These are the 'privileges' which this Londoner described as "more precious than rubies."

**Vital Subject For Commons Discussion**

OTTAWA, March 5 (CP) - Opposition circles here expressed the view over the week-end that the session of parliament which opens March 8 should be given sufficient time to discuss four questions: War Appropriation Bill, with assurances from the government as to the reinforcement situation; Civil estimates and what progress has been made in the various features of the government's reconstruction program; 3. Mutual aid, which will bring on a debate on how efficient U. N. R. A. will be in looking after the needs of United Nations countries made destitute by the war;

Government's proposals to be presented at the United Nations security conference to open in San Francisco April 25 and which will doubtless set off a debate on Canadian foreign policy.

It has been suggested that the session would not last longer than 10 days and the government could end it any time by dissolution of Parliament, but opposition circles expect much longer than 10 days to deal with all these matters and may be expected to criticize the government for not calling the members together at a much earlier date.

**Little Change In Iwo Battle Lines**

QUINTON, March 6 (Tuesday) - United States Marines grimly pressing Iwo Jima's strongly entrenched Japanese toward the north and northeast, cliffs made no major attack Monday but broke up a number of enemy attempts to infiltrate American positions.

An American communiqué today said the battle lines remained substantially unchanged as the three divisions of Marines held two-thirds or more of Iwo, consolidated their holdings elsewhere on the small but vital island, and fighting now is in its 18th day.

A communiqué yesterday reported that 12,884 Japanese dead had been counted up to 8 p.m. Saturday and 51 prisoners taken.

Improved weather conditions facilitated unloading operations on Iwo's beaches.
