PURCHASE OF 4,000 ACRES IN SUFFOLK (London Exchange)

One of the most important transactions in English landed property this year was completed last week. Trinity College, Cambridge, has purchased nearly 4,000 acres six miles from Ipswich. It is the Trinity and Walton portion of Mr. Preyman's Orwell Park estate. Orwell Park and the rest of Mr. Preyman's property are not in any way affected. The sale includes 17 farms, many small-holdings, and houses and cottages in the parishes of Walton, Trimley, St. Mary, Kirtton, and Trimley St. Martin. The lower reach of the River Orwell forms the boundary for a long distance, and at this part there are 850 acres of grazing land. On the east side the boundary of the property is close to Felixstowe; and on the south the purchased land extends to within a mile or so of Landguard Point, which forms a natural breakwater for the entrance to Harwich Harbour. The rent-roll is almost £5,000 a year, and the land, farmed by substantial tenants, ranks among the best in Suffolk, being in that fertile area enclosed by the Deben on the north-east and the Orwell on the south-west. The purchase is as an investment, and there is no intention to cut up the estate, but there are miles of frontage to the main road from Felixstowe to Ipswich that seem to be capable of development, and if such a policy is eventually adopted the college would presumably deal with sites by the grant of building leases. But about this nothing has yet been suggested. The transaction is important not only because of the area of land and the amount of money involved, but even more so as an indication of the growing tendency of corporate bodies to look to real estate of the agricultural type as a sound permanent investment.

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY—The regular monthly meeting of the Children's Aid Society for Prince County was held in the Town Hall on Tuesday evening, the President Dr. J. A. McPhee, presiding. The Agent of the Society, Mr. Vincent J. Harrington, reported on several cases he had investigated in the country and also stated that two small boys had broken into a drugstore in Summerside last Sunday and taken an auto tire and several other articles. They are to be brought before the Juvenile Court. Several members stated that the great difficulty in dealing with Juvenile Offenders is the fact that there is no reformatory of any kind in this Province. Offenders have to be sent to Halifax or St. John at great expense and only the worst cases can be sent. It was suggested that the Government might buy a farm and establish a reform school thereon where the growing list of juvenile offenders for the Province might be dealt with. In Summerside the agent reported that the police and himself had a very busy time with small boys entering buildings, pilfering people's gardens, breaking windows, etc., and at one time thirty-two appeared before the Juvenile Court.—S.

came apparent in the shallow water. The young inventors made their diving helmet by cutting out the bottom and sides of the boiler, leaving apertures for the wearer's arms. A square hole then was cut in one end and a piece of windshield glass was soldered into place. The air supply is furnished by 50 feet of garden hose fastened to a pipe on the helmet that was used for the cold water inlet on the tank. The other end of the hose is connected to two double-action force pumps which furnish the air. When the helmet is used it is placed on the head and shoulder of the wearer, and the pumps started. The diver steps from a small boat, and the weight of the helmet carries him to the bottom, where he is able to walk about unhampered. The air forced into the helmet escapes under the sides
