As our prices were figured this year absolutely on the market, we, of course have to make a slight advance to cover this. It now looks as though prices had touched bottom some time ago, and were now on the up-grade, and that there is no prospect of any further drop. We believe that you will be perfectly safe from now on. Prospects are that if they hold off in buying they will pay a little more. They have been hold off for some time figuring that there would be a further drop, but all indications at the present time do not point that way and would strongly urge buying at today's prices rather than wait."
