At Sydney last week the schooner Janet, loaded fifty-five tons of coal and sailed for Georgetown, P. E. I., and the schooner Morning Light loaded 28 tons of coal and sailed for Grand River, P. E. I.

North River oysters are selling at \$6.00 per barrel, West River \$5.50 per barrel and East River at \$4.50. Oysters by the quart are retailing at eighty cents. Judging from the catches, oysters will be extremely high this season.

The Methodist church at Pownal has done well to secure Rev. Wm. Brown as one of their speakers for their missionary meeting tonight. Not only has Mr. Brown had a fine experience as a missionary in the Philippine Islands, but he is one of the most magnetic speakers one can possibly listen to. With the Rev. Wm. Harrison and W. C. A correspondent from Pinette writes that the people are busy digging their potatoes in that settlement. The crop is only a light one this year.—McLean Dixon and Willie Ross are visiting friends in Garfield the guests of William Wallace.—John A. McWilliams intends leaving shortly for the lumber woods.—Robert Stewart and Harold McTavish paid a flying visit to Garfield last week. While there they were the guests of Charles McEachern.—John J. Shaw is doing a horse shoeing business this fall.—Joseph Dixon is visiting in Iona the guest of Archibald McTavish.—Harry McTavish paid a flying visit to Murray River last week.—The apple crop is a poor one in Pinette this fall.

A writ has been issued by W. S. Walker, Registrar of the Superior Court, Montreal, against the owner of the steamship Bonnavista, acting on the instructions of the advocates for Edmund Daneau, of St. Thomas de Parryville, of Richibucto, captain and owner of the barge Ernest. The owner alleges that on Sept. 23rd the Ernest was in Montreal harbor at the pier between the Black Diamond wharf and the Quebec Steamship Company for a cozen days. He was occupied in discharging brick and alongside was the large Aurore Boreale. At 2.30 in the afternoon he states the steamship Bonnavista was to the aid of a tug was making her way to her place at the Black Diamond wharf, when, as he alleges, by a false manoeuvre, she collided with the Aurore Boreale, which, as a consequence, crashed against his barge and broke on its side as well as a railing, the bridge and a post. The Ernest began to take in water, which necessitated pumping. To have it repaired, he states it would require \$200 and for lost time \$80, so he claims \$280, alleging that the Bonnavista without sufficient space in which to land at the wharf, as it had often been done before. Aurelius Houde, of St. Jean Deschallons, captain and owner of the Aurore Boreale, has also entered suit for \$150, claiming that by the collision two railings were broken, the bridge was crushed in and the sides smashed. In the actual damage he claims \$100 and \$50 lost time in repairing the damage. He also puts forward the same reasons.
