It is not pleasant to read of perjury and bribery. It is the lawless disposition not the law that is responsible for these evils. We cannot enjoy immunity from stealing, smuggling or violence, where the lawless disposition exists, without law, nor the inevitable result of its enforcement in exciting the propensity to perjury and bribery. The law does not create the propensity nor will it improve the character of the lawless. The Scott Act and honest officers have made Nova Scotia one of the soberest countries in the world. Good people, misled, are often among its traducers.—Windsor Forward.

Manderson of Hamilton, intends remaining on Prince Edward Island for a short time, when she will return to Indiana to resume her chosen work.

THE many friends of Mr. Robert M. Harper, B. C. L., of Red Deer, Alberta, where he was practicing law, will be grieved to learn of his death yesterday, after three days' illness, caused by heart disease. Mr. Harper, formerly practised law in this city, being a member of the legal firm of Truell & Harper, and the news of the passing away of one who gave every promise of a brilliant career has come as a great shock to his many friends here and the deepest sympathy of the whole community goes out to his father, Dr. Harper, Inspector of superior schools for the Province of Quebec, and family in their sad bereavement. The late Mr. Harper was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I., 27 years ago, and received his early education at the High school, Quebec, matriculating at Morrin College, where he succeeded in taking, for exceptional brilliant work, the Governor-General's silver medal. He studied three years in Morrin College and his final year at McGill, graduating as a B. A. in 1894, as the gold medalist of his year. Four years later he received the degree of B. C. L. from Laval University, and at the time of his entering the ranks of the legal profession he was the youngest lawyer in Canada. He was popular in social circles and for two years was the indefatigable secretary of St. George's Snowshoe Club. It has not been decided yet where Mr. Harper will be buried, but the probabilities are that the remains will be brought to Quebec. The late Mr. Harper was a brother of Mr. John Harper, of the Intercolonial R.R. way tickets office of this city.—Montreal Witness.
