Neighborhood Terrorized by Gas Explosion

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—More than a hundred persons were injured and an entire neighborhood terrorized today by the explosion of more than 4,000,000 feet of gas, and the collapse of its container. The blast, accompanied a towering column of flame, came without warning and spread burns, desolation and fear through a district covering about six blocks and peopled mostly by foreigners.

Automobile Backs Over Thirty Foot Embankment

STELLARTON, N. S., Aug. 1.—Mrs. Clarence Grant, 35, Stellarton, was killed and three others were injured here this evening when the car in which they were driving, stalled on a hill, and with the brakes ineffective ran backwards over a thirty foot embankment to the edge of the East River. The accident occurred at the southern end of the town, and at the foot of a hill which goes up with a curve from the Stellarton end of the south end bridge. True man McNeal, brother of Mrs. Grant had several ribs fractured and a leg injured, and Mrs. McNeal, his wife, sustained a bad cut and bruises. Angus McNeal, father of Mrs. Grant, received a scalp wound. The four year old child of Trueman and Mrs. McNeal escaped with a small cut on the lip when the mother threw the child from the car before the plunge was made.

Chain Gang Graduates

THE PAS, Man., Aug. 1.—After being marooned on an island with only food for 22 days, Frank Reynolds, a 47-year-old trap per, has been rescued according to word received here from Mile 32, on the Hudson's Bay Railway. Reynolds, who has a sack on Cormerant Lake, went out some three weeks ago in his canoe looking for duck's eggs. He landed on a small rocky island and during his search a storm blew up and his canoe blew away. The trapper was entirely isolated on a spot seldom visited by travellers. There was no fuel for building a fire and no protection from the elements. The only means of obtaining food was water snails, snail-crawfish, wild mint and the roots of reeds. He was conscious when found by a local trapper but very weak. He is, however, recovering rapidly and states it was the heating and strengthening properties of the wild mint that kept him alive.

Britain Will Pay Her War Debt to U.S. Conditionally
