Inspecting Fish Products Important Part Of Work Of Fishery Officer

Nearly 230,000 Parcels Inspected In Past Year Under Fish Inspection Act By Officers Specially Trained—Inspection Done Also Under Meat And Canned Goods Act.

Part of the training which the permanent Fishery Officers in the service of the Dominion Department of Fisheries are required to take consists of instruction to qualify them as inspectors of fish products and in putting this training to use last year they inspected nearly 230,000 parcels of smoked pickled, and drysalted fish.

This work was done under the Fish Inspection Act, and regulations made under the act, and in addition to passing upon the processed fish the officers inspected the curing plants and the containers used for marketing the output.

They also carried out inspection work under those sections of the Meat and Canned Foods Act and regulations which provide for the inspection of fish canneries of all kinds, their raw materials and methods, and the products themselves.

All of these inspections, which are part of the regular work of the Fishery officers stationed in the areas where the fisheries are administered by the Dominion authorities, have it as their purpose, of course, to make it sure that the products put upon the market will be of sound quality.

During the last year, moreover, some of the regulations relating to inspection were altered with a view to making them still more effective and amendments made to the Fish Inspection Act at the recent session of Parliament and the creation this spring, of a permanent board of experts to inspect all canned salmon put up in the great British Columbia salmon industry will also be important factors helping to make the standard of Canadian fish production even higher than it has been hitherto.

Poet Is Lauded By Great Critic

MONTREAL, Sept. 14. — The homely poems of Dr. William Henry Drummond, written about the simple and picturesque "habitants" of Quebec Province, at first aroused considerable indignation among the French-speaking people in Canada. Sir Andrew MacPhail said recently. The French folk of the province were more sensitive in those days, Sir Andrew said, and considered Drummond's verses in the broken English dialect of the habitant as holding the race up to ridicule. The censure and prejudice was lifted, Sir Andrew said, when Louis Frechette, then poet-laureate of Canada and a French-Canadian himself, wrote an introduction to Drummond's volume. In his introduction he stated that nowhere can be found a single line of caricature or grotesqueness. There is now a renaissance among the French, Sir Andrew said, of poetry, literature, sculpture and connoisseurship, which is realized by all too few. The French spoken in Quebec is as good as that spoken in the provincial towns of France, and the best English spoken in Montreal is that by French people.

CHINESE GIRL TAKES UP NURSING

MONTREAL, Sept. 14. — (By The Canadian Press) — To become a nurse so that she may return to Hong Kong and be of service to the people of her native city is the ambition of Rose Wong, who was brought to this city by her parents Mr. and Mrs. F. Wong of this city, at the age of four months. She was educated in Montreal High School and Highland Manor School, Tarrytown, N. Y., and is now preparing to enter the School of Nursing at John Hopkins University. "I know nurses are very few in Hong Kong and I plan to return there to work," said Miss Wong, this serious minded Chinese girl who is very pretty and very much a Westerner.
