### IN ST. JOHN

When the Abbies clashed with the Moncton Hawks the other night such men as Steve Estabrooks, Nicholson, Squarebriggs, Lawlor, and Saunders, the property of the Island club, were sitting on the sidelines watching their mates go down to defeat; while sitting back in Moncton, five players who started in Maritime hockey circles had to be content to wait for press reports of the game. They were Norman Cook and Ed Kervin, of last year's Moncton outfit; Foster Woolley, who was with the champion Winnipeg team last season; Aubrey Webster, last year with Fredericton, and Ken Carrol, who has been starting with the Bathurst Papermakers for the past several seasons.

A new rink is in course of construction in St. John that will be completed early in December, and official notice has already been made known that they will foster a senior team this year, and officials have intimated that they may seek entry in the "Big Three" circuit. They could put practically all the members of the Dalhousie team, last year's Maritime champions, on the ice if they felt like going to the expense, and at the present time several of the players are now in the city negotiating with the mentors. An announcement is expected from the capital city within the next few days as to the course they plan to pursue.

It seems that the officials of each of the three clubs are not slow to realize that such a situation is liable to confront them, and they have approached Amherst officials in regard to entering a team from that town, offering to aid them in the way of players by each club giving them men to strengthen their line-up."

Halifax will have at least two men who will be handed their blue cards when they get under way at the Capital tonight. Just who they will be hasn't been made known by Coach Steve Vair, but they could lead one of their goalies to Amherst for the season and still have plenty in reserve. Out of this array of players a team could be picked that would give any of the big three a hard tussle, and with the added incentive of having been released as weak sisters on their original clubs they would be a hard team to beat.

With only three teams participating in the newly formed Maritime Hockey League, the rumor has gone afloat that interest will be lacking in the loop long before a winner has been declared. ## N. B. Centres To Discuss Hockey

ST. JOHN, Nov. 24—Representatives from Fredericton, Sussex and Saint John, and possibly Moncton, will gather in this city today for a round-table discussion pertaining to the possibilities of reviving the old Southern New Brunswick Hockey League. The session is likely to take place at the Royal Hotel and perhaps by 1.30 p. m. Delegates from the Capital—E. C. Atkinson, M.L.A., and J. B. Dickson—will reach the city about noon, it was thought by local interested parties.

The feeling at present is optimistic as to the outcome and that four snappy hockey teams can be produced to form the league. The executive of the Fredericton Hockey Club management met Tuesday night in the office of Secretary D. Dickson where they discussed the coming winter's prospects. It was decided to have representation of two at the meeting in Saint John.

As for hockey players the Fredericton men state they have first claim on the Dalhousie aggregation. They believe that they could divide with Saint John in this matter with what home players are available.

However, it was pointed out that such matters would be discussed at the meeting here today and if the league goes through will be definitely settled.

## New Southern N.B. League Organized

### Saint John, Fredericton, And Sussex Represented In Loop — Officers Elected.

B., Nov. 24—The Southern New Brunswick Hockey League, embracing St. John, Fredericton, and Sussex, was organized here today at a meeting of representatives from these three places. This League was in operation the season before last. St. John's membership means that the city will not take a place in the New Maritime Hockey League later this year when a rink is completed here.

Applications for franchises from the St. John Tigers and University

of New Brunswick will be considered early in December, as well as the matter of a schedule and referees. If the Tigers are admitted the League will include two teams from St. John, the first unnamed and unselected as yet.

Ross R. Brown, Sussex, was chosen president of the S. N. B. League, and J. B. Dickson, Fredericton, vice-president. A secretary will be named by the president. The executive is: Dr. Frank Boyaner, St. John; Harold Limerick, Fredericton and K. W. Edmonston, Sussex.

"Let Them Default," Says Hoover  
Speaker John Mance Garner, the Vice-president-elect, who led the Democratic contingent into this morning's cabinet room conference at the White House, and later into parley with Mr. Roosevelt, reiterated in public a belief expressed by several at both meetings.

"Let them default?" he exclaimed in answer to questions. "Who said they would default? They won't."

Just what stand the President-elect himself took upon Mr. Hoover's statement of policy was not disclosed before he left the capital for Warm Springs, Ga. Ogdan Mills, Secretary of the United States Treasury, who conferred with him after a morning spent with the President, was asked whether the commitments had been made by Mr. Roosevelt.

"Wait and see" was the treasury secretary's only reply.

Associates of Roosevelt said he had made no commitment.

## Hoover Suggests Exchange of Views

President Hoover suggested in his statement that the agency he proposed "to exchange views" with foreign debtors should be closely allied "with the United States delegations to the world economic conference and to the general disarmament conference."

By such a course, under the direction of the president and with the final decision in the hands of Congress, he asserted, the United States could "take the strongest possible co-ordinated steps toward the solution of the many underlying causes of the present calamity."

"It is unthinkable," he said, "that within the comity of nations and the maintenance of international good will that our people should refuse to consider the requests of a friendly people to discuss an important question in which they and we both have a vital interest irrespective of what conclusions might arise from such a discussion."

### Provincial Comment

The former procedure was suggested by Mr. Bennett in his remarks in the House of Commons last night. The latter was the method pursued in connection with the old age pensions legislation but in that case some of the provinces were opposed and still remain outside the scheme.

"Personally I am all for it," said Premier George S. Henry, of Ontario. He voiced the opinion unemployment insurance was bound to come and promised Ontario would take part in the conference. Quebec would "gladly accept the invitation," said Premier L. A. Taschereau.

Pending receipt of official word from Ottawa neither Premier C. D. Richards of New Brunswick nor Premier J. D. Stewart of Prince Edward Island would comment on the proposed conference. Nova Scotia cabinet ministers had nothing to say in the absence of Premier G. S. Harrington who is now in Ottawa on government business.

All four western premiers expressed approval and Premier John E. Brownlee of Alberta, voiced the hope the conference would not stop at unemployment insurance but would consider other aspects of the constitution which need overhauling.

Saskatchewan would be glad to co-operate, said Premier J. T. M. Anderson. Premier John Bracker of Manitoba promised to join "wholeheartedly in making the conference a success." British Columbia would certainly be represented, said Premier S. F. Tolmie who said he would be glad to see the Dominion take over the relief of unemployment whether by means of insurance or in any other way.

The public had been in favor of unemployment insurance for some years, said Tom Moore, President of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. Mr. Bennett's announcement brought renewed hope to those who had been advocating it. The government could be assured of the full-co-operation of organized labor.
