THREE "FATHERS" OF LORDS DIE WITHIN BRIEF PERIOD

LONDON, Sep. 14.—Three "fathers" of the House of Lords have died during the last few months—Lord Coventry, Lord Hereford, and Lord Waldegrave with 71 years service Lord Waldegrave has been a peer longer than any other man. Lord Huntly now holds this record. He has been a peer for 67 years. The next on the list, Lord Grantley, has been a peer 53 years. Lord Waldegrave once quoted against himself a remark made to him by a political opponent with whom he had been having a heated argument. "You mark, Lord Waldegrave," was the remark, "are the greatest asset of the Conservative party." Lord Waldegrave was a Liberal.
