DECEIVED BY THEIR LEADERS.

A series of letters recently printed in the Cape Times, under the heading, "A Boer on the War" and written by one of the number who were captured with Prinsloo by Gen. Hunter, affords instructive light upon the feelings of the respective parties to the great struggle now approaching an end in South Africa. This writer is obviously a man of peaceful and moderate views. He tells that "never in history has a war been so mercifully waged on both sides," and adds: "In face of everything said to the contrary, there is very little hatred between the true Briton and the Boer."

This is gratifying, to begin with. He admits that there is bitterness on the Boer side, however, growing out of the surrender of Prinsloo's commando, but avers that it comes wholly from the Boers being deceived by their lying and conscienceless leaders. He proceeds to narrate the circumstances of the surrender of Prinsloo, after being surrounded by Gen. Hunter's forces, giving first the Boer leader's version, and after it the true narrative of what took place. We quote:

"Negotiations were opened, and eventually a man (Vilone) was sent to General Hunter with the final conditions. These conditions were explained to the burghers and were to this effect: Every man was to keep one horse, to receive a pass to his farm, and to be allowed to remain there unhindered after taking the oath of neutrality. With this understanding they surrendered, and then found that instead of having horses returned and going home, they were all sent off under escort as prisoners of war and deported. The perfidy of the British, represented by General Hunter was plain. It was proved that a British General's word was not to be taken, and his honor worthless. This news was spread all over, and awoke the bitterest feelings. Till today those men believe they were trapped by General Hunter with false promises, and till today their wives, mothers, sisters and children are cursing the General and crying for revenge. Every Boer in the field believes it, and is afraid to surrender on any terms offered, as in every offer he sees merely a blind with the road to Ceylon behind it, and consequently more blood is shed daily. Who is to blame for this? Naturally, everyone will very properly say General Hunter. That is, however, only one side of the matter.

"Now let us look on the other side, and see the truth. When Vilone left the commando for the British camp he carried two letters to General Hunter. In the one was the offer of surrender with the conditions as above, and that was presented first, waiting for a reply. He had waited for more than two hours, when he heard that the commando was moving, and order given that should the movement continue fire should be opened. He then presented the second letter to General Hunter. The contents of that letter were unconditional surrender, and this was, of course, accepted and acted upon. That is the positive, unvarnished truth. General Hunter only did what was strictly honorable in warfare, and in accordance with his behavior during the whole war. The leaders know it, and President Steyn knows it well, yet the truth is hidden, and the vile falsehood is used to defame the honor of a most gallant enemy and honorable gentleman, and through him the honor of a nation of brave men and considerate victors, to be used as the great incentive to spur tired, war-sick men to desperation and dishonored death, to cause poverty-stricken women and children to cry out for revenge and blood and to plunge an unhappy country further into the mire of ruin."

BISHOPS CONTEND

The Oath of Accession in its Provisions

IS INSULT TO CATHOLICS

A Memorial Asking to Have the Obnoxious Features Eliminated.

The Catholic archbishops and bishops of Canada have addressed the King of England, through the agency of Cardinal Vaughan, a memorial dealing with the oath of accession and asking to have its provisions, insulting to Catholics, eliminated. The communication, made public for the first time to-day reads as follows: To His Eminence Cardinal Vaughan, Archbishop of Winchester.

Your Eminence.—The archbishops and bishops of the Dominion of Canada, having read the amiable circular letter recently addressed by your Eminence to your clergy, regarding the declaration and oath of accession which an iniquitous legislation still imposes on the Sovereign of England, beg to offer to your Eminence their earnest congratulations as well as the expression of their full and entire adhesion to that well-timed protest.

The words of that oath wound too deeply the conscience of Catholics and insult too keenly their feelings to permit those who have the happiness of belonging to the Church of Rome to refrain from seeking by all legitimate means to abolish it forever.

Very many of our separated brethren, prompted by a sense of justice as honorable to themselves as it is pleasing to us, consider that the hour has come to efface from the statutes of the Empire that evil reminder of former discord and hatred; they judge the time opportune to give to the twelve millions of Catholics, over whom Edward VII. reigns, a precious and long-desired pledge of peace and religious liberty. In accordance with this spirit the parliament of Canada, now in session at Ottawa, resolved a few days ago, without distinction of creed or party, by an almost unanimous vote, to petition for an elimination from the oath of accession of all expressions hurtful to the feelings of His Majesty's subjects. In doing this, parliament merely voiced the general sentiment of the country. In writing to your Eminence, and laying, as it were, through your agency, the respectful expression of our grievances at the foot of the throne, it is far from our desire to raise a religious controversy which might disturb the peace of the empire; on the contrary, it is the love of peace, of a solid and lasting peace founded on justice that inspires our action.

England owes to us, your Eminence, this tardy act of justice. She owes it to a religion whose apostles are in every land and whose supreme head on earth is Leo XIII, a pontiff who is acknowledged by our separated brethren themselves to be of exalted character, of noble purpose, and of a wisely progressive mind, rarely equalled in the annals of humanity. She owes this justice to Catholics who are daily growing more numerous throughout the ever-widening Empire and who have never been sparing of their loyalty to the crown. Those have, it seems to us, the right to claim in return that the crown, in the person of the Sovereign, shall respect their most sacred and cherished beliefs. She owes it to illustrious men who by a succession of wise measures, have modified her public law abolishing in the case of the highest functionaries of the state a most unjust and vexatious declaration, but one which deplorable and odious though it must be, the Sovereign is still forced to make. She owes, in fine, to her title of a generous Christian nation, of a civilizing power under which liberty, equity and tolerance flourish and outworn prejudices are replaced by respect for right, whilst conscience, under the safe guard of the law, is held inviolable. Therefore your Eminence, it is our solicitude for the best interests of England, for her fame and glory, as well as zeal for the things of God, that urges us to claim what so many earnestly solicit of her government, viz, that the beginning of the reign of Edward VII. may be signalized by such a change in the wording of the oath of accession as shall continue powerfully to promote the unity of her people and to increase in the hearts of Catholics the gratitude they have never failed to show for similar reforms. We shall all unite in prayer to this end so that He Who holdeth in His hand the heart of princes, may design in His infinite wisdom to shape the course of events so that the ardent desire of Catholics in all parts of the Empire may be soon fully realized. We beg to remain, your Eminence's most devoted humble servants.
