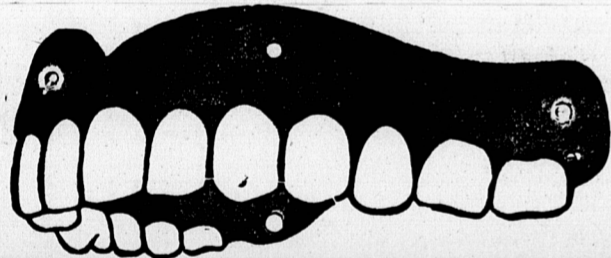

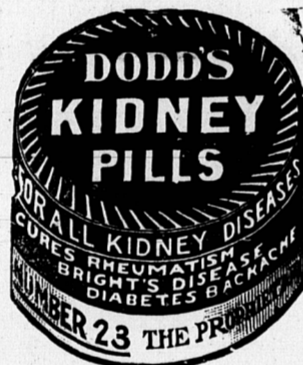

### A WARNING TO FARMERS

The Farmers' Advocate of October 7th contains an article by "Octogenarian" on Buckwheat to Subdue Sow Thistle. As this weed is becoming very plentiful in this Province, and besides the loss sustained from a lessened crop of grain, injures the reputation for producing pure seed. The Guardian quotes in full as follows: "Here is where buckwheat becomes a factor in checking this vile weed. By disking, cultivating and harrowing when the land is dry, previous to sowing the buckwheat in June, it is smothered. It is prevented from seeding, that fall-plow, preventing any seeds that have germinated sending out lateral root stocks. I do not think it is an impossibility to eradicate this weed, but if only one farmer here and there uses drastic means to subdue it, the result will assuredly ruin the farm and bankrupt the farmer."

A beautiful looking farm was pointed out to me that could be bought for \$3,000. A large field had been sown with oats. I am safe in saying there was not more than the seed sown on the ten acres. I never witnessed a more deplorable sight than that field. Now is the time for the farmer to beware, and immediately adopt some system of cropping that will prevent the seeding of this most pernicious of all weeds. No weed is better provided by nature with the means of spreading abroad its seeds. Everything should be done that can possibly be done to prevent the further spread of this weed in this Province. It is now very bad and there is a danger that it may be the means of our seed grain that is sold to other provinces requiring to be marked."

### INVESTIGATION TO BE HELD.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 9.—Attorney General Hazen has ordered Coroner Doherty, of Campbellton, to hold an inquest in the deaths of the deceased railway employes, and has instructed W. A. Mott, of Campbellton to represent the Crown at the inquest.

### THE WORLD'S BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 9.—Pittsburg National League Champions won the first game in the world's Championship Series, 4 to 1. Detroit was outclassed in every department of the game, although in the first three innings, the American Leaguers outplayed their opponents.

### INCREASED REVENUE FOR SEPTEMBER.

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—The monthly financial statement shows that the revenue for September was \$8,853,659, and for the six months period \$47,338,819 as against \$7,282,950 and \$40,727,522 respectively a year ago. The Merchants Bank has given notice of its intention to apply for authority to establish a Pension fund.

### PROVINCIALIST HAS NARROW ESCAPE.

BOSTON, Oct. 9.—Charles Silva, 51 years old, of 180 Sydney St. Dorchester, was arrested last night by Reserve officer Foley of station 11 on the charge of assault and battery with a sharp instrument on James P. Keenan of 174 Sydney St.

Keenan, who was taken to the office of Dr. John J. Sullivan, nearby, was found on examination to have three wounds on his left breast. Two were of little account, but the third was, according to the physician, two inches deep. Keenan was able to go to his home and no serious results are feared.

According to witnesses of the assault and the police, Silva had been drinking, and as he came along Sydney St. toward his home at 8.20 he stopped before the home of Keenan, who was sitting on the doorstep. Keenan says that Silva jumped upon and cut him. (James P. Keenan, referred to is a son of James Keenan of this City.)

### WHAT WINSTON CHURCHILL SAYS.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—Some members of the Cabinet are opposing the compromises which are assumed to be being urged by King Edward to prevent a constitutional crisis over the budget. Winston Churchill has declared that the Government would make no overtures to the Lords and would accept no compromise; and no amendment to the Finance Bill by the Upper House would be entertained. "The House of Lords," Churchill added, "had no right to interfere with the financial business of the Government directly or indirectly, and Liberals having united Party and resolute Prime Minister, were ready for the conflict if it were upon them."
