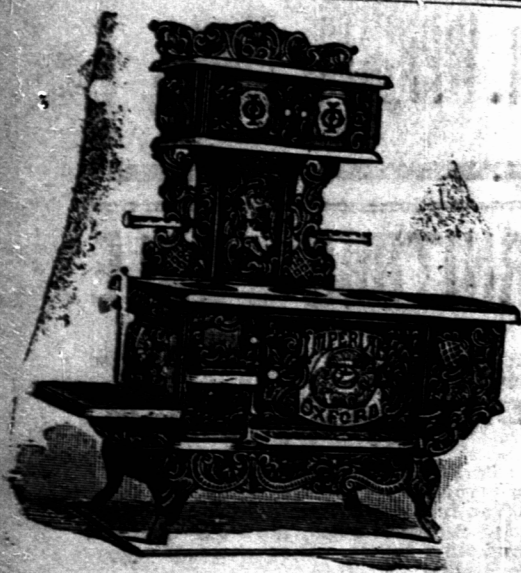

MR. TARTE'S POSITION.

In regard to Hon. J. I. Tarte's repeated utterances in favor of higher protection The Guardian has hitherto taken the view that he is merely taking the wind out of the Opposition leader's sails by exploiting the protectionist sentiment of the country for the time being. But it must be admitted that a more serious view of the case is being taken by certain prominent Liberal journals. For instance the Hamilton Times after quoting extracts from the speeches of Hon. Messrs Tarte and Fisher reaches the conclusion that "there is a distinct line of cleavage and the public will be surprised if one or the other of those ministers does not find another job ere long But one thing we are sure he (Mr. Tarte) can and will learn, namely, that the tail cannot wag the dog." This is by no means complimentary to Mr. Tarte, and it comes from an influential journal that has usually been in close accord with a majority of his Ontario colleagues. But the Halifax Chronicle, which is the principal organ of the Finance Minister and the Minister of Militia, is even more discourteous not to say in-

sulting in its comments. Here is a special men passage of the Chronicle's recent attack:

Hon. J. I. Tarte claims the "right to change his mind." It is conceded without demur. But when he, in effect, demands the right to change the mind of the Liberal party—that is another matter. Mr. Tarte is hardly the man to change the mind of the Liberal party in so important a matter, and one requiring such broad, and sane, and serious consideration as the tariff policy of the Dominion of Canada. And then, it is to be remembered that Mr. Tarte's "high protection" speeches are always made after he has dined or lunched—and victuals have such a way of going to the head, at times. Mr. Tarte's Toronto victuals must have been very "neady," etc.

We do not remember having before seen in any ministerial journal of either party so broad an intimation that the public utterances of a Cabinet Minister were due to an inebriated condition. This utterance is coarsely unjust to Mr. Tarte whose habits are temperate, so far as the word can be applied to one who is not a total abstainer. Mr. Tarte partakes of wine at public dinners and may do so in his private repasts for what we know, but we have never read or heard of him being inebriated. Continuing in the same strain the Chronicle in the article referred to said:

But apart from the merits of the question entirely. Mr. Tarte is sadly in need of a few plain words of admonition from a friendly, and in many respects admiring source. He seems to be in danger of taking seriously the good old Opposition joke about his being "the master of the Administration." Either that or he must intend to separate himself definitely from the Government in the near future and again ally himself with the Opposition. As can scarcely expect that he will be permitted to continue indefinitely or even for any great length of time to preach a doctrine which has long been and still is absolutely repudiated and condemned by the party through which he holds office.

This can only be interpreted as an intimation that Mr. Tarte must either moderate his protectionist utterances, or be silent, or take himself out of the Cabinet. When the organ of one Minister thus coarsely assails another Minister and colleague matters are surely becoming serious. It is true that since the utterances above quoted, The Chronicle has somewhat moderated its tone, but its columns cannot even yet furnish pleasant reading for Mr. Tarte or his friends. There is evidently a very considerable absence of cordiality in the federal Liberal party just now.

When Lord Melbourne was Premier of the United Kingdom and was troubled by differing opinions publicly expressed by his colleagues he got them together and remonstrated. "It matters not so much what you say, gentlemen, but you must all say the same thing." At least two of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's colleagues are just now in need of similar discipline, to wit, Messrs Tarte and Sifton. They do not say the same thing on the tariff question and they will not be silent. Sir Wilfrid being absent and not to return for two weeks hence the situation grows awkward. Unfortunately for the Government the Opposition is too weak to furnish the requisite outside pressure to keep the ministers in order.
