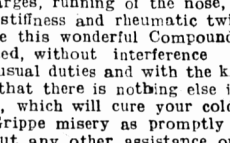

A DIAMOND WEDDING IN PISQUID

A celebration of rare occurrence took place in Pisquid West on Tuesday the 15th inst. to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the marriage of the parents of the Rev. John A. McDonald of Grand River, Lot. 14.

Sixty years ago Angus McDonald, son of Allan McDonald of Garryhill, Scotland, and Catherine McGillivray, was united in the holy bonds of marriage to Eliza McDonald, daughter of Donald McDonald of Lochaber and Catherine McDonald of Gensish. They were married in the old St. Andrew's church by the late Rev. Pius McNehe, who has long since passed away, as have the witnesses of the marriage, Alexander McDonald, who died in Wellington, New Zealand, and Clementine McDonald, afterwards the wife of the Hon. Donald Baxton, who died many years ago in Charlottetown. Mr. McDonald is the last survivor of a large family, the best known being Nelly, the mother of the late Bishop McDonald; Ann, the mother of the Rev. James A. McDonald; Ronald, the father of the late Rev. D. J. G. McDonald, and the Rev. D. R. McDonald, V. G., better known as Father Dan. Mrs. McDonald is also the last of her family, the last to cease from his labors being the late Very Rev. Mgr. McDonald, V. G. Though aged respectively 89 and 92 they are in the full enjoyment of their faculties and can discuss current topics as intelligently as they can recall the past, loving to speak of the different students of the old St. Andrew's College nearly all of whom have been called to their final rest.

The day was celebrated by the offering of the Holy Sacrifice by their son, Rev. J. A. McDonald, who had invited many of his friends of the clergy and laity to be present for the occasion. Among those present were the pastor of St. Andrew's, Rev. A. P. McLellan, Rev. A. J. McIntyre, Rev. P. D. McGuigan, Rev. J. J. McDonald; Rev. I. R. A. McDonald, Rev. R. J. McDonald and Rev. D. P. Croken. The Rev. pastor of Kirkcubright the choir while Miss Mary Collins presided at the organ in her usual brilliant manner and many of the members of the choir of St. Andrew's and St. Theresa's assisted with splendid effect. The grand-children of the jubilarians, John J. and John D. McDonald, served the Mass. The altar was prettily decorated with natural flowers, the gift of Mrs. (Dr.) Collins of Vernon River. At the service the aged couple received Communion. Many of the friends of the family were present from the surrounding parishes. All the members of the immediate family were present except one son in British Columbia. Besides Father John there were Allan Joseph, who lives on the homestead, Mrs. John B., of Vernon River, and Daniel J., who came home from Grafton, Conn., with his wife for the occasion.

A grand wedding dinner was served, gotten up in Mrs. A. J. McDonald's best style with the assistance of the friends of the family and it is needless to say that all did justice to the appetizing viands.

After dinner Father McLellan, on behalf of the clergy present and the Rev. Gregory McLellan who was unavoidably absent, in his own happy manner gave expression to the sentiments of the clergy and congratulated the aged couple wishing them many more years to live. He made a presentation of a casket of golden coin. Father John replied for his parents thanking the kind donors and then read the congratulations which were sent by His Excellency the Apostolic Delegate, Mgr. Stagnani, wishing them many more years to serve the Lord faithfully. Also kind wishes from Mrg. Sinnott and a letter of regret from Bishop Morrison of Antigonish, were read. Besides the many gifts presented by the guests were valuable ones from Miss Bell Gillis, Mrs. Joseph B. McDonald, and Dr. Collins who were unable to be present.

The afternoon was spent in music and song and social converse in which Miss Collins was assisted by D. D. McDonald and Ronald McDonald. Mr. McDonald himself showed some of his old form at the violin. As the shades of night began to fall the visitors returned to their homes after wishing the jubilarians all good wishes and receiving the thanks of the family for contributing to the success of the celebration.
