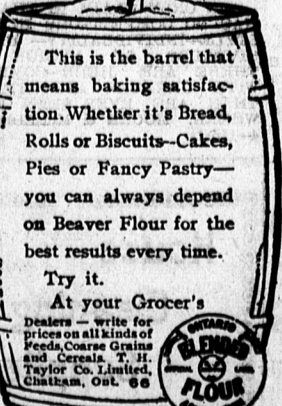

RACING QUALITIES OF THE KING OF TROTTING STALLIONS

By S. W. Parlin. CRESCUS (2.02 1/2)

Crescus, by Robert McGregor (2-17 1/2), was foaled in 1894. He was bred, trained and driven in his races by George H. Ketcham, Toledo, O. He was first campaigned as a three-year-old in 1897, and gained lasting fame by the gameness and endurance which he exhibited in races against aged horses, that were old campaigners. He contested in two races in one day at Springfield, Ohio, July 13th, 1897, where he won second money in the three-minute class, and first money in the 2.29 class. Crescus's most remarkable race that season was at Cleveland, Ohio, August 10 and 11. There were 13 starters and it was for 2.17 trotters. Five heats were trotted August 10, when, owing to the lateness of the hour, the race was postponed to the following day. The time of the respective heats was 2.15 1/2, 2.14 1/2, 2.12 1/2, 2.12 1/2, 2.14 1/2. Crescus's position in the summary that stood 7-2-2-1-0. The next day Crescus came out and won in consecutive heats, time 2.12 1/2, 2-11 1/2, 2.11 1/2. Experienced horsemen were amazed at such a performance by a three-year-old colt. Many of them said, "Too bad to spoil so good a colt, but that race must have ruined him. He will never be heard from again."

The following week, however, August 17, at Syracuse, N.Y., Crescus won the 2.22 trot in straight heats, time, 2.18 1/2, 2.19 1/2, 2.17 1/2. Eleven days after his Syracuse race Crescus was one of 12 that started at Readville, Mass., August 23, in the 2.20 class, and he won easily in straight heats, time, 2.14 1/2, 2.11 1/2, 4.11 1/2. Crescus was started in 12 races that season, won first money in six, second money in five and third money in the other. As a four-year-old, in 1898, Crescus was started five times, won first money twice and stood second, third, fourth in the summaries of the other three. He did not lower his record that season. In 1899 Crescus started in eight races won first money in four; second in two and third in two. He reduced his record that season to 2.07 1/2 in the second heat of a race that he won at Glens Falls, N.Y., August 15, and equalled it in a race that he won in New York State, September 4, following. He won seven heats in 2.10 or better that season. He started in five races and seven times against the watch in 1900, won first money in each of the five races, and lowered his record to 2.04 against time at Cleveland, Ohio, October 6.

Crescus's most strenuous race that season, and one that tested both his courage and endurance, was the free-for-all stallion race at Readville, Mass., September 26. It was a five heat race. The first two heats were won by the game stallion Charley Herr in 2.07 1/2, 2.07 1/2. Crescus finished third in the first heat and second in the next one. The third heat was back in the same notch 2.07 1/2 and was so close between Crescus and Charley Herr that only the judges who stood directly over the wire, could tell which horse's nose went under the wire first, but Crescus got the decision. Charley Herr fought out the fourth heat so gamely that he forced Crescus to trot the mile in 2.07 1/2 to beat him, and the time of the fifth heat was 2.08 1/2. It is not probable that either Crescus or Charley Herr ever met a gamer antagonist than in that memorable race.

In 1901 Crescus started in four races and won first money in all of them. He made a record of 2.03 1/2 in the first heat of a match race that he won from the Abbot, at Brighton Beach, N.Y., August 15. He lowered his record to 2.02 1/2 against time at Cleveland, Ohio, July 26, and at Columbus, Ohio, August 2, lowered it again to 2.02 1/2, making him not only the world's champion trotter as well, an honor never held by any other trotting stallion. During each of the seasons of 1892 and 1893 Crescus trotted exhibition miles in public. In 1892 he lowered the two-mile trotting record to 4.17. Crescus (2.02 1/2) stands at the head of the front rank of champion trotting stallions, both by virtue of his record and his superior racing qualities. He started in 35 races in all, won first money in 21 of them, second in eight, third in four, and fourth in two. He was never behind the money in any race that he started. He trotted in races against time and in public exhibitions, recorded in the Year Book, a total of 155 heats and 65 of them were trotted in 2.10 or better. He made his record without the aid of a wind or dirt shield, in front of him, pulled by a runner. Crescus is the champion of champions (American Horse Breeder). Island breeders it would cost you three hundred dollars to breed to this wonderful trotting horse, but you can breed to his good son George Crescus in your own province at a reasonable fee. 4-1111resal.
