Reports Submitted At Annual Meeting Of The City Council

The following reports, in addition to those appearing in yesterday's issue, were submitted at Thursday's annual meeting of the City Council:

LIGHT COMMITTEE

In presenting the annual report of your Light Committee I would respectfully point out that the major part of its activities during the past year, viz. the hearing by the Board of Commissioners of public Utilities of the complaint of the City of Charlottetown against the rates charged by the Maritime Electric Co., Ltd., was dwelt with in the report submitted by your Committee at the last regular meeting of this Council. As this report was quite comprehensive and of necessity quite long, and as it is on file with the City Clerk, and has been published in full by both the paper and the Guardian, do not feel that it is necessary, or advisable, to take up any more of the time of this Council, even on a matter of such importance, except to say that your Committee is gratified indeed that it was able to push this investigation to what it believes this Council considers a satisfactory conclusion during the time that its members held office as your Light Committee.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

The fact that the general population are becoming more health-minded is shown by the very great increase in the number of patients attending the clinic for examinations at our weekly clinic held in the Provincial Sanatorium. During the year one thousand and thirty-nine examinations were made, an increase of nearly an increase of eighty-eight per cent over the figure for the preceding year. This number includes 262 First Year Prince of Wales College students who were examined for tuberculosis or other communicable diseases on entering college.

TELLING FURS APART

Know what a prime pelt is and how to recognize one? (The time of year in which the animal is caught has much to do with the appearance and durability of the skin. The coats of cold-water animals attain their greatest beauty in the late winter. At that time the hairs are thick and long, they have a live and alert appearance. The coats of warm-water animals are thin and short. The skin is rich in oil, soft and pliant. The fur looks smooth and glossy. Pelts taken at that time of year are classed as "prime". The under-side of such skins has a different color from that of animals captured out of season, when the light color of the natural light under-skin assumes a bluish tinge. Water animals, such as muskrats, on the other hand, are prime in spring, when the water is coldest. Spring pelts can easily be distinguished by the thick underfur and the richness of the guard, or long outside hairs.)

Know what blending is and how to recognize it? (Blending is used to darken inferior pelts of an expensive type to make them look like their better sisters. A brush or feather filled with dye is run over the tips of the hair. In this way the under-skin shows no sign of the artificial color but the fur will fade quickly and with uneven appearance. It is difficult to recognize it, but a white handkerchief rubbed over a blended fur will generally get smudged.)
