Two Killed in Crossing Accident MONCTON, N. B., June 14 - Two Saint John men, Harold I. Sullis, aged 38, and Peter McCarthy, aged 49, are dead and Richard J. Wilson, of Moncton, lies in the City Hospital here in a serious condition, suffering from internal injuries and a broken arm, as the result of a tragic railway crossing accident at the C. N. R. roundhouse, about one and one-half miles from the city, shortly before noon today, when the auto in which they were riding was struck by an incoming special passenger train carrying Vice-President S. J. Hungerford of the C. N. R.; General Manager Walter U. Appleton and other C. N. R. officials to this city from Saint John, Leaside Arsenal, also of Moncton, the fourth occupant in the ill-fated automobile, escaped with slight injury, sustaining only a cut in the back of the head and he will be able to leave the hospital in a few days.

According to information gathered here, it appears that Sullis and McCarthy left Saint John early this morning for Moncton, the former driving the car. Their intention was to visit a friend named Kelly, an employee of the C. N. R. roundhouse. After doing so, they left the roundhouse and, going out, met Wilson and Arsenal, C. N. R. electricians, who had completed their weekly inspection of the wiring at that plant. The visitors were to drive them to the city and after crossing the main line tracks to the street entrance to the roundhouse all four got in the car, which had been left facing the track while the visitors went to make their call. Upon starting the car, the driver, apparently to turn round, figured it would be easier to turn around in the space next to the roundhouse than where the machine was parked. In order to do this, he had to cross the double main line trackage. There is a down grade of about 30 feet before reaching the rails and he apparently noticed the oncoming train, which was on the furthest track, and he got his car almost to a standstill, with enough room for clearance, when, as the engine was but a few feet away, the car was seen by the engine fireman, J. E. Pond, to leap forward. The train struck it fair in the centre and swept it, with the four occupants, along the tracks for 171 feet, when it was tossed to one side onto the westbound main line, a pile of debris.
