UNDER PROHIBITION.

As usual, wherever a prohibitory law is in operation, the friends of a saloon are giving out their opinions and statements that "the law is a failure", and that "more liquor is being sold than was sold under license" and so forth. No such false version of the facts should be permitted to go into circulation. In the third week of the operation of the Act there is a notable decrease in the amount of drunkenness on the streets, and a notable diminution of the nuisance of corner loafing. A number of the men formerly engaged in liquor selling have, to their credit be it said, abandoned that business. Others keep the front doors of their places of business locked, and only by secret signals can admission be gained.

We submit to any man in honest trade, whether in groceries, dry goods, or hardware, that he could not under such conditions transact anything like the usual volume of business. There are some places open for the sale of "table beer" and considerable quantities of this are being sold. It proves very unsatisfying to the old toppers, who, when brought into court have little hesitation in swearing that it is not intoxicating. There is no doubt that a trusted few are still able to obtain whiskey but the consumption is small indeed compared with the pre-prohibition days. When a miller constructs a dam that will raise the water and set it at work driving the machinery he does not expect to stop all the water. There will be some leaks, and these will require his attention. It is thus with the Prohibition Act. It is thus with the dykes of Holland. No miller proposes to abandon his business, nor do the Dutch abandon the lands below the sea level because of the leaks in dam or dyke.

And it is to be observed that the illicit sellers, notwithstanding the boast that the law is unconstitutional, have still a wholesome dread of being served with summonses. Only on Saturday last one of the number, who was carefully keeping out of the way, was caught and served just outside of the locked door of his saloon, while he was hurriedly trying to turn the key and escape within. The saloon men evidently do not rely wholly upon the alleged unconstitutionality. They are extremely anxious not to be caught. The reports that "the saloons are wide open in Charlottetown" are the reverse of the fact. Only a small, sneaking, "speak easy" trade is being carried on in the line of drinks admitted to be intoxicating.

Premier Roblin gives out that he expects Manitoba's wheat crop this year to total 45,000,000 bushels. It is not yet harvest time, however, and the summer frosts have to be reckoned with.

Ottawa is renewing the agitation to get rid of the toll-gates which cross all the main roads leading to and from the Capital. There is not and has not been for a generation past such a thing as a road toll-gate in the Maritime Provinces. But our inland cousins are very slow to learn some things and have tolerated the nuisance until now.

It is not pleasant to read that the bull-fight has been introduced at the Buffalo Exhibition. This is done to please the Spanish Americans from Central and South America. One feature only is eliminated. The bull is not actually killed. He is however goaded to madness and desperation by darts and banderillas, and the men and horses take the usual risks of the regular Spanish bullfight. It is a barbarous and brutal sport.

PROPOSED IMPERIAL BUDGET.

Thomas McFarlane in the Ottawa Commonwealth has outlined a scheme for an imperial budget that will no doubt commend itself to the advocates of preferential trade within the Empire. The central idea is an import duty of five per cent on all goods from foreign countries, the proceeds to be kept as a separate fund for naval defence. Mr. McFarlane thinks that in this way \$2 millions sterling (\$110,000,000) would be obtained of which \$80,000,000 yearly would be levied in the United Kingdom and \$20,000,000 in the Colonies. This would be purely an extra and independent tariff and need not interfere otherwise with the existing tariff or trade policy of any British country.

It is claimed that under this arrangement Britain's exports to the outer Empire would be increased, foreign competition in British markets would be lessened, the production of breadstuffs within the Empire would be stimulated and the effect of foreign bounties upon production would be largely neutralised. At the same time the Colonies would receive the much desired preference in British markets and would be induced willingly to contribute to Imperial defence. And it is argued that this would only be an extension of the policy under which the Canadian and Australian Colonies have been federated, giving freer trade among themselves with the offset of a higher tariff against outsiders. It seems not unlikely that some form of a trade league or customs union may be the next, though not immediate step, in the consolidation of the Empire.
