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German Reserves To Be Home By 1st Of November

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Every German Reservist called to the colors this summer and during the Czechoslovak-German crisis will have returned to civil life by Nov. 1, an official spokesman announced today.

The spokesman said no exact figures on the reserve strength marshalled by Germany would be made public, but he said that one figure mentioned in political circles—500,000—was "grossly exaggerated."

It also had been estimated that Germany had more than 1,000,000 men, counting reservists and regulars, under arms at the end of September.

The spokesman added that the term demobilization would not be used because, officially, Germany never had mobilized.

Work on the fortifications continued unabated. Labor reserves for this week were being drawn from labor service recruits who started their six-month training Oct. 1 and volunteers from Government offices. In addition these are regular paid workers, skilled and unskilled.

Maritime Retail Sales Increase By 12.7 Per Cent

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—(CP)—Retail sales in the Maritime Provinces totalled \$187,740,000 in 1937, exceeding by 12.7 per cent the \$166,565,000 recorded for 1936, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Comparison between 1937 and the low point reached in 1933 disclosed a 44 per cent improvement although sales last year were still five per cent below the 1930 level. Nova Scotia sales in 1937 were \$99,336,000, a gain of 12.6 per cent over 1936. New Brunswick \$76,658,000, up 14.3 per cent, and Prince Edward Island \$11,748,000, up 3.5 per cent.

For the third year in succession motor vehicle dealers in the Maritime Provinces reported the best improvement in the year-to-year comparisons. Their sales, totalling \$27,510,000, exceeded those for 1936 by 28.1 per cent. As a result of continued building activity, the sales of dealers in lumber and building materials were 22.6 per cent greater, while sales of hardware stores rose 16.4 per cent.

Education Council Holds Convention

SACKVILLE, N. B., Oct. 18.—(CP)—The 19th convention of the Maritime Religious Council began here today in the Main Street Baptist Church when the general board met to hear reports. This evening worship service was conducted by Rev. H. L. Denton, of Charlottetown. P. E. I. Mayor C. M. P. Fisher welcomed some 60 delegates at the service and Rev. C. G. MacKenzie, pastor of the United Church here, extended welcome on behalf of Sackville churches.

MORE ROOM NEEDED BY CORNER WINDOWS

Windows that run round corners should be given more room than ordinary windows.

To admit the same amount of light, corner windows need to be about 40 per cent larger than windows which are placed in one wall only. The amount of light admitted into a room is determined by the straight-line distance between the sides of the window opening. A corner window with fourteen running feet of glass has the "light equivalent" of an ordinary window ten feet wide.

TWO WAYS TO PLANT BULBS FOR SPRING

1—Where bulbs are to be planted among perennials in the border, without disturbing the established plants, a hole the proper depth should be dug for each bulb with a trowel or a dibber. In either case be sure the hole has a flat (not pointed) bottom so the bulb rests on loose soil and is not "hung" in an air pocket. Mix a tablespoonful of balanced plant food thoroughly with the soil covering each bulb.

2—Where bulbs are planted in space free of other plants, a bed may be excavated to the maximum depth necessary for your planting. Loosen soil on bottom and level it. Place in desired locations, the bulbs which should be planted deepest. Then start filling in to their required depth. Plant food spread over the surface before excavating, at rate of four pounds to a hundred square feet, will be well mixed with the soil by the operation.
