The market was well attended yesterday and supplied with all the products of the season. The first green peas were in and sold at 30 cts a quart; cucumbers, 10 cts; cauliflower, 5 to 10 cts; young cabbage per head, 5 cts; and turnips per bush, 5 cts. Strawberries were quite plentiful at 20 cts a quart. There was a slight decrease in the price of butter, some being sold at 16 cts per lb., but the prevailing price was 18 cts. Eggs still hold their own at 14 cts. Oats, white, sold at 36 cts, and black 37 cts per bush; hay from 60 to 70 cts per ton, and pressed hay per ton \$13. Potatoes, wholesale, were selling at 20 cts per bush.

A death of more than ordinary sadness is that of Mrs. John Gillespie of Appin Road. On Thursday of last week, Mrs. Gillespie left for a short visit to friends and relatives in Massachusetts. She arrived in Boston on Friday and on Monday while with her son in the graveyard where her mother was buried suddenly dropped dead over the grave. The remains were brought over by the Northumberland on Wednesday evening, just seven days after she had left the island apparently in the best of health. Mrs Gillespie leaves a husband and twelve children, all of whom were present at the funeral. They have the heartfelt sympathy of many friends. Interment was at Bishaw cemetery on Thursday.

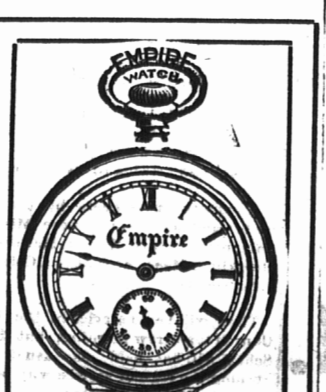
