PINETTE BOY GASSED

Mr. S. A. Murchison, Pinette, received the following telegram from the Director of Records, Ottawa: "Sincerely regret to inform you of the death of Pte. John Malcolm Murchison, Infantry, officially reported admitted 3rd Field Ambulance Depot, Sept. 24, 1917, suffering from gas poisoning." Pte. Murchison left here with the 105th Regiment and was subsequently drafted to France. He was wounded in the forehead last March, and on recovery returned to the front to be in time for Vimy Ridge and Hill 70. He was in another engagement in which 150 went in and only three, including himself, came out unscathed. Mr. Murchison has another son Angus at the front in the 98th Siege Battery. He has been nearly two years in France and so far has escaped without a scratch.

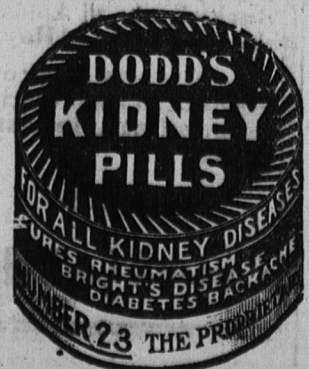
