THAT CAR OF YOURS

This article will be devoted to the reply to R. D.'s letter entirely, as it entails considerable space.

Ques.—Dixie magneto on cycle will fire on one plug, then on other one, sometimes on both and sometimes on neither, but even if spark is good on hind cylinder when plug is out it will not catch when placed in cylinder. Plugs are all right, cables new, brushes new, and making good contact; spool clean, etc. Manufacturer said rotor was rubbing on pole shoe. Would this be cause of trouble, and how can it be remedied.

Ans.—I would suggest a systematic checking of the magneto. It is of the high tension, shuttle type magneto, and so that you may understand its operation I will explain as follows:

The magneto comprises magnetic pole shoes and armature, wound with both primary and secondary windings, with condenser connected in series with primary line.

The primary winding becomes saturated with current whilst points are closed. Immediately points open, the secondary winding induces the current from the primary winding (latter overwound by the former) transferring it to 18,000 volts, and this current in its endeavor to return to its source, namely, ground or magneto (magneto is grounded), travels to the spark plug via brushes and collector ring, across plug gap to ground. The condenser absorbing the amperage protects the points from arcing.

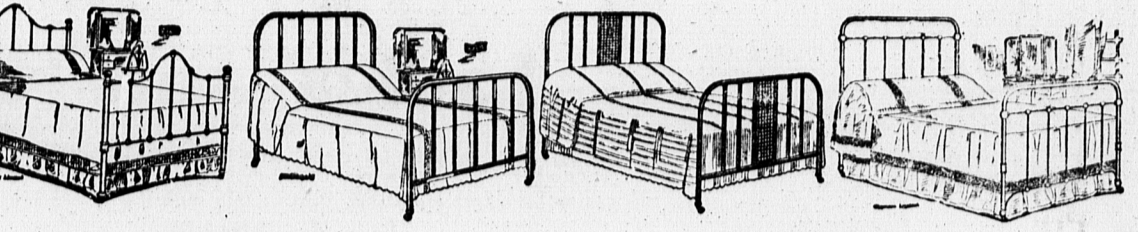

The method of checking that you adopt is as follows:

Remove armature, previously placing a steel or iron bar across the magneto to act as a keeper. Clean both pole shoes and armature with a clean cloth (not waste.) Smear the armature shuttle or section in the middle that passes the pole shoes as it rotates with very little Prussian Blue in oil. Instal armature again, being careful not to touch the pole shoes as you slide it in. Assemble completely with face plates and screws and slowly revolve the armature. The manufacturer stated that the rotor was touching the shoes. If this is the case you will find that some of the blue has rubbed off the armature onto the field pole shoes when it will be necessary to buy the two end plates for it, as these plates contain the bearings. This trouble is due to worn bearings allowing the armature to rub on the field shoes—then the magneto is grounded. This would cause the trouble of which you speak. Next remove the condenser entirely and connect a line from a car battery to a head lamp bulb (double contact 6 volt), then from the other terminal of the lamp to the terminal of the condenser, then from the other terminal of the condenser to the remaining terminal of the battery. If the lamp lights the condenser is useless; if it does not light it is O.K. when the condenser can be replaced on the magneto. A condenser cannot be repaired. The condenser is a small tin foil block under the top face of the magneto, I believe. See also that the brushes are on contact when the points open. This is all that can be done without a proper test set for locating ground: ed armature, open circuits, etc. I believe, however, that the manufacturer's decision is correct, and your Prussian Blue test will prove it. I will be glad to hear from you again.

on newsprint and printing paper has been made to the Commonwealth Government by the Amalgamated Zinc Company of Melbourne which offers an exchange to establish a customs duty of \$29.20 per long ton on newsprint from the United Kingdom, which under the new trade agreement, would include Canada, and a duty of \$43.80 per long ton on newsprint from other sources of supply. This would represent roughly, from 40 to 44 per cent duty on newsprint which now enters Australia free under the British preference, and is taxed \$14.50 per long ton under the intermediate and general tariff.

There is at present practically no newsprint manufactured in the Commonwealth.
