The program of events is 100 yards run, three miles run, running broad jump, 220 yards run, pole high vault, throwing the discus, 440 yards run, 120 yards hurdles, putting 16 lbs. shot, 880 yards run, (10 hurdles, 3 ft. 6 in. high) throwing 56 lbs. weight, one mile run, running high jump throwing 16 lbs. hammer. A gold medal emblematic of the Championship of Canada will be given to the winner in each event. A silver medal to the second and a bronze medal to the third.
