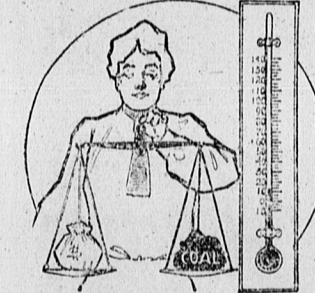

During the past year J. A. Clark Supt. of the Experimental Farm, has done considerable under-draining and he has also been making some experiments on soils. He will therefore have something interesting to tell the farmers of King Edward Institute on Monday afternoon, Dec. 18th, at 2:00 p.m. The meeting is to be held in Harrington Hall. Every one interested is invited to be present.

Yesterday morning a party residing at Grafton Street called at the police station and informed the officer in charge at the time that his son-in-law was under the influence of liquor and was trying to gain admittance to the latter's residence where his daughter, the inebriate's wife, was in hiding from the fury of her husband. He told a story of threats made by the man against his wife which if carried out would be a repetition of the Crippen crime of some time ago. Officer Walker visited the scene and on his arrival the man who had been complained of had departed for parts unknown. The last seen of him was in Queen Square when he was evidently making for the wharves.

A peculiar circumstance occurred recently at the home of a storekeeper whose shop and residence on Pownall Street are combined. The storekeeper's wife was in the shop and the gentleman himself was in one of the living rooms of the house when a noise was heard in the cellar. On investigation the man found a party in the cellar who, in his haste to get away, had tripped over a box and had been hurled up stairs, and out the door with the proprietor in full pursuit. He was not fast enough however and was captured near Sydney Street and offered as an explanation of his conduct that he wanted to have a quiet drink and thought the cellar a good place to go. The indignant shopkeeper liberated his captive after admonishing him rather severely on his future conduct.

Among the recent questions and answers at Ottawa prior to the adjournment of the House were the following: Mr. McDonald: 1. Does the government intend to introduce any legislation to provide for the exclusion of Japanese or of other Oriental races from Canada? Mr. Roger: The matter has not been considered. Mr. McDonald: 1. Who has been appointed pilot for the D. G. S. Minto for the season of 1911-12? 2. Is the person appointed a licensed pilot? If so, for what pilotage district. Mr. Hazen: 1. Captain Buote has been appointed temporarily. 2. No. He has been for years sailing in and out of all the ports in Northumberland Straits in command of a vessel. Mr. McDonald: Are the supplies required for the boats on the winter service between Picou and Georgetown to be furnished by the stewards of the steamers, or to be purchased directly by the department? Mr. Hazen: All food supplies will be purchased and supplied by the stewards with whom the department has contracts.
