A writer in the Monthly Review declares that Germany harbors deep designs against South America and the Monroe Doctrine. Germany desires to colonize South America and to develop its natural resources. There is certainly no doubt that South America requires colonization and development. Possibly the richest country in the world, and one whose riches have been known for 400 years, it is unimportant from whatever point of view it may be regarded. The people are lazy and degenerate, the value of their production is small, and their revolutionary proclivities make their country a most undesirable place for any outsider to attempt to reside and do business. Venezuela is perhaps the most glaring example of South American Republicanism. It is twice as large as France and has a population of only two and a half millions. It has a superb system of waterways, and one river, the Apure, which has been described in the British consular reports as "a second Nile," so astonishingly does it fertilize the lands that it yearly overflows. Unlike the Nile its hinterland is not a sandy waste, but a magnificently fertile and well-watered region. The mineral wealth of the country is incalculable. A consular report is quoted as saying that, "iron, gold, coal, petroleum, silver, copper, lead, are found in every direction." Mining industry, however, like every other, is almost impossible, owing to insecurity of tenure. There have been fifty revolutions in the country during the eighty years that have elapsed since it obtained its independence; and each leader in succession refuses to recognize titles to property or concessions granted by his predecessor. But the other States are not a great deal better. This is the state of affairs. Germany is credited with a desire to take hold of South America in a businesslike way, open to its population, it will industrialize Germany, and make of it a great market for German manufactures and source of wealth to German enterprise. Germany finds that the Monroe doctrine lies in the way of this grand conception by which so much would be done for civilization; and incidentally, for Germany. The first obstacle which Germany has to overcome to carry out this beneficent policy is the Monroe Doctrine. What right, says this exponent of German policy, has the United States to prevent civilization?

from getting the benefit of the exploitation of South America at the hands of self sacrificing Germany? Germany thinks the United States has no such right, and upon this interpretation, the Venezuelan business was a trial balloon to see how far the Monroe doctrine went in practice, while Germany is building a navy to meet the haughty and monopolizing Yankee upon the Spanish Main. The ethics of such expansionist theorizing do not apparently involve any consideration for the opinions of the inhabitants of South America themselves. So we will pass them over. But there are one or two practical difficulties in the way of Germany successfully carrying out any such scheme independently of the Monroe doctrine altogether. One of these is the fact that in British Guiana Great Britain possesses a slice of South American territory, which is just as rich as any other portion of it. Yet it is in almost as backward a condition as any other part. We have not a high opinion, in fact we have a very low opinion, of British Crown Colony rule. But it is unquestionably far superior to Germany Crown Colony rule. And it may suggest itself that if British Guiana has not progressed under British rule, the rest of South America would not progress very rapidly under German rule. Another important consideration is that Germany, after the resistance of the United States had been subdued, would not be welcomed with open arms by the different peoples in South America. Even German emigrants have a singular and practical dislike to the colonial system of their own country, their love for which is strictly confined to sentiment. These South American peoples would give Germany a very interesting time. The commercial development of the country would inevitably be postponed until the hated native had been exterminated, unless indeed Germany proposes to wait until the South American peoples have exterminated one another. The suzerainty of Cuba and the Philippines made Spain bankrupt. South America would bankrupt Europe, let alone Germany. The Monroe doctrine is an unadulterated benediction to European nations, if it is effectual in curbing any vagrant ambition they might possess to mix themselves up in South American affairs.

JUVENILE SUICIDES

The Chicago Tribune which keeps careful records of many cases of abnormal happenings calls attention to the increasing frequency of suicides of young persons. Suicides in general are increasing in the country at an extraordinary rate, the number in 1902 being 8245, which is 1000 more than in the previous year. At the ratio of increase for the first three months of the current year, the total will be much larger than for 1902. In the latter year the suicides of women were three times as many as in 1901, and the ratio of increase continues in the current year.

Regarding the suicides of young persons, the following is given as an incomplete record for the last two weeks: A boy of 13 at Marine City, Mich., shot himself rather than go to church; a young married woman only 16 drowned herself at Port Jarvis, N. Y., because her husband of 18 would not give her an Easter bonnet; a boy of 15 at Baltimore shot himself because he had to work; a boy of 18 at Hamilton, Ont., hanged himself because he was cheated in a horse trade; a girl of 17 in Chicago poisoned herself because her mother forgot to deliver a message to her boy lover, and a young man of 18 poisoned himself in Chicago because he failed to find his sweetheart at home when he called. What is the matter with our civilization that such a shocking record can be made? Surely, something is wrong. It is a subject that demands the attention of every serious student of social conditions. During the last ten years in Europe more than 400 persons under 15 years of age committed suicide. The United States is likely to surpass this awful record.

Here is the intelligent manner in which the Buffalo Times discusses the Gamey indictment. "For several weeks past what is known as the Gamey scandal has been the talk of Canada. Last night it became a British subject by the discovery that R. B. Gamey, the principal in the affair, was a guest at the Mansion House, in this city. Mr. Gamey is a member of the Dominion parliament from Manitoulin Island, which is at the head of Georgian Bay. He was elected as a Conservative, but surprised all Canada soon after taking his seat at Ottawa by voting with the Laurier government. This led to all sorts of talk, until finally Mr. Gamey said he had been bribed by the Liberals to support them."
