The temperature which on Thursday night measured as low as fifteen degrees above zero, rose rapidly yesterday morning, and by nine this morning, registered thirty-five above. Then another sudden change set in, and it grew rapidly cooler—at nine last night being only twenty-two degrees above.

The last night snowfall of Thursday night, has had the effect of covering the bare spots that existed on the country roads, and sleighing has thereby been greatly improved. A notably enjoyable treat was given at the Laborers' Protective Union Hall on the occasion of J. T. Clarkin's lecture on ancient Irish history. This being the last case for trial the jury were discharged and the Court adjourned until next Tuesday when arguments will be heard.

These birds are so tame that anyone so inclined could kill them with a stick. No one, however, desires to molest them, thanks to the teaching of the school teachers, who are active in preaching the gospel of bird protection. Probably the Game Association, and the natural kindness of those who see the birds also protects them from harm. They are beautiful little creatures and winter visitors that deserve a hearty welcome.

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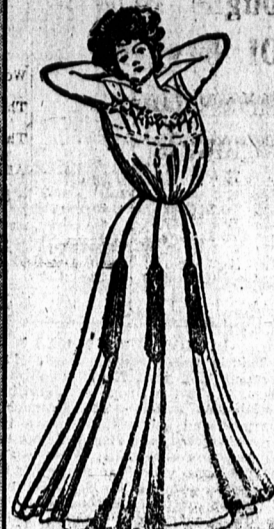
