Mr. and Mrs. Power returned to the City on the Northumberland yesterday afternoon from their wedding trip. The admission to Bazaar at St. Joseph's Convent will be ten cent. Bazaar opens at three o'clock and tea will be served at five.

Tea and admission will be twenty-five cents at St. Joseph's convent this afternoon and evening and tomorrow afternoon and evening. Among the passengers to this City by the Northumberland yesterday afternoon were a number of commercial travellers who are here soliciting Fall trade.

The western mail train arrived in this city at ten forty-five last evening being twenty-five minutes late. All inward trains of yesterday were on time with the exception of the morning train from the west which was half an hour late, the Murray Harbor train, which was ten minutes late, and the Cape Traverse train which was one hour late.

In Central Christian Church last evening Rev. J. P. Floyd chose "How the Treasurer of a Queen became a Christian" as the basis of his sermon. The discussion was eloquent and energetically demonstrated and delivered in such a capable manner that his instructive and educative traits will not doubt bear fruit. The solo singing by Mrs. J. S. Floyd was very impressive and a pleasing feature of the service.

At the People's Theatre last evening Sandy McLeod appeared on the stage, made a few remarks and treated the audience to the sword dance. Santer, in his own genial and humorous way, said he had practiced the terphiscorean art since he was five years old, when he took the measles, but his performance belied his words. He was recalled but a courtesy had to satisfy all. The picture was good, the nightly change making a noticeable improvement.

CLOSING COTTON LETTER. (From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—The cotton market is showing a very distinct disposition to discount a bullish Government crop report early next month and if the south shows any readiness to follow an advance some of the bullish predictions may be realized. It is increasingly evident that consideration of the census figures has had a tendency to reduce the average view of the probable yield. The first effect of the census report as we see it was bullish chiefly because the figures were a little smaller than expected. The fact that the crop estimators stuck to their position in the face of the figures and selling by spot people in competition with realizing by buyers on the census figures caused the reaction. But it seems that after further consideration the bullish view of the ginning figures is beginning to predominate. The current argument in that connection runs about as follows:

While this year's crop was later than that of last season, the general killing temperature late on October made it improbable that any more cotton was made after November 1st this year than last. Now appears that the ginning per working day for the time between November 1st and 14th this year showed almost as much of a falling off as it did during the same time last year and if no more cotton has been made after November 1st this year than last then there is no reason why ginning for the balance of the season should not show as rapid decrease as it did after November 14th last year. In such a case the commercial crop would be under twelve million bales at the best and the more extreme bull claim that the falling off is likely to be even more rapid. The market opened at a decline of 7 to 13, sold about 14 1/2 lower and then advanced on covering the bull support with every indication that some strong interests were accumulating long lines in advance of the Government estimate. There still seems to be a good deal of cotton for sale around 15 c.
