**"Jack Holt" At Capitol**

It is the return journey which provides, "Flight Into Nowhere," with one of the most surprising climaxes the screen has ever offered.

**DEFENDS SPANKINGS FOR YOUNG CHILDREN**

A few of my fellow workers in the field of parent education seem to be "all hot up" over my deliberate approval and advice regarding spanking of young children to teach them the meaning of No. says Dr. Garry C. Myers, P.H.D.

Earlier unopposed these critics seem to be over the hundreds of young children maimed for life, or slaughtered in the streets, because they never had acquired respect for the unmanageable, nor for the mothers always worn out, some going to untimely graves, over failure to manage their unmanageable children when they didn't dare to spank. They seem, moreover, to ignore those children who for want of early inhibitions turn out to be juvenile delinquents.

Granted for argument that all the foregoing items are unworthy our consideration, there still remain some other factors. A parent whose child doesn't mind, will inevitably face situations when feeling it necessary to do something decisive, she will shake at the disobedient child. Even a span will suddenly assist from a forbidden act, or drop an article from the mouth. If one will read research at him, he will find a wise compromise deter the child at least until his nervous system has grown calloused to the father's unwise shrill.

The way from the mother's hand to the child's back, the young child, and she probably will employ the same method as a punishment, but it is with her voice that she wishes to carry on a comfortable conversation with her child, and later, home to win his cooperation, and to exercise her influence toward him. "I'd like to spank you," she says, "but the more often the voice of hers has been associated with disobedience, the less likely it will prove her association in the child's mind.
