The Mrs. Bruce referred to, has, in the Providence of God been spared to learn that her fourth descendant has already appeared in the person of little Willie Ryan, aged nine months.

This feature in the life of Mrs. Bruce is truly remarkable and worthy of more than a passing notice—five generations in unbroken lineage having each a living representative.—Com.
