Bruins Go On Scoring Orgy, Down Amerks 6-2

BOSTON, Dec. 3—(AP)—Boston Bruins broke out in another scoring orgy against New York's luckless Americans to gain their first National Hockey League home victory in five starts, 6-2, tonight before a 7,000 crowd at the Boston Garden.

Goalie Earl Robertson managed to hold the Bruins to one goal, made by Bill Cowley, during the wide-open first period but the Bruins drove five more pucks through him during the second session.

The Bruins' second-period scoring outburst included Cowley's second tally of the game and countered by Roy Conacher, Jack Shewchuk, Flash Hollett and Woody Duhon, who had only to fire into an open net after Robertson jumped out to save against Milt Schmidt and then dropped his stick.

Lorne Carr scored Tommy Anderson's drop-pass and Norman Larson got the Amerks' their second goal by pelting off a four-man rush with Johnny Sorrell, Murray Arm-

Trophy Awarded To Armstrong

NEW YORK, Dec. 3—(AP)—For his contributions to boxing in losing as well as winning, Henry Armstrong today was awarded the Edward J. Neil Memorial Trophy which annually honors the memory of the Associated Press Boxing Writer and war correspondent who was killed in Spain.

In naming Armstrong unanimously, the Boxing Writers Association of New York considered his gallant showing in losing his welterweight championship to Fritzie Zivie two months ago as much as the fact he is the only ringman in fight history to hold three world titles simultaneously.

The third annual award of this plaque will be made at the Writers' annual dinner, Jan. 9, at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. Armstrong follows Jack Dempsey and Billy Conn as winners of the award, which goes to "the man who has done the most for boxing" each year.

The writers also named their selections as the leading challengers in all fight divisions.

The Boxing Writers voted the following outstanding challengers in order for each division:

MONTREAL, Dec. 3—(CP)—Led by the Calgary and Leveck, Ont., Rifle Clubs which posted perfect scores of 1,500, provincial championships were announced today after the first round of the 1940-41 Dominion Marksmen Rifle Championship competition.

The nine provincial title holders will compete for the Dominion Marksmen Challenge Shield about the middle of September.

Vitt asking For \$2,500 From Indians

CLEVELAND, Dec. 3—(AP)—Cleveland Indians of the American Baseball League disclosed today Oscar Vitt is asking the club for \$2,500 claimed due under the attendance clause in the former manager's bonus contract.

"Oscar thinks we owe him \$2,500 and I'm sure we don't," said President Alva Bradley. "I've suggested that he ask Commissioner Landis for a ruling. If he doesn't I'll probably do so myself."

Bradley said the difficulty hinged on interpretation of a supplemental mid-season agreement. Oscar was generally believed to have received \$17,500 for the last campaign. Replaced for next year by Roger Peckinpach, Vitt recently signed to manage the Portland, Ore., club.

Parshall led Circuit drivers

GOSHEN, N.Y., Dec. 3—(AP)—Dr. H. M. Parshall of Urbana, O., led the drivers on the Grand Circuit in point-scoring in 1940, the United States Trotting Association announced today.

Parshall, with 54 winning heats, piled 952 points on a point-scoring system awarding 10 points for a winning heat or dash, six for second, three for third and one for fourth. In 1939 he compiled 1,250 points to finish first.

Frank Egan of Lexington, Ky., who took down \$23,000 with Spencer Scott in the Hambletonian here won six of seven other major purses on the Grand Circuit for \$43,000 to Parshall's \$40,750 and E. Roland Harriman's \$37,400.

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 3—(AP)—Representatives of major league baseball men milled through the lobbies of Atlanta hotels on the eve of the 90th annual convention of the minor leagues.

TORONTO, Dec. 3—(CP)—Lou Salica and Small Montana received their purses here today after a brief delay in which Ontario Boxing Commission doctors examined Montana to make sure he had been in proper condition to fight last night.

Salica scored a technical knockout over Montana in the third round of last night's world bantamweight title bout here, and his body punches bothered Montana so much the Boxing Commission ordered an investigation before the purses were presented. Montana was floored 10 times before the fight was stopped.

X-ray plates were said to show Montana to be in good physical condition and payment was made promptly on receipt of the Commission doctor's report.

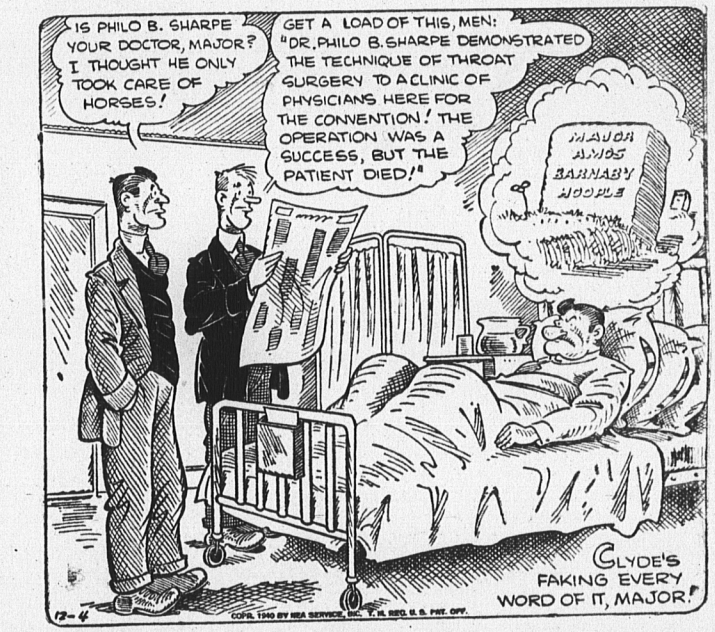

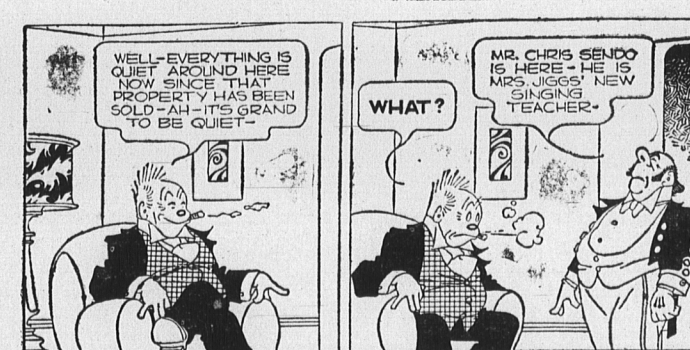

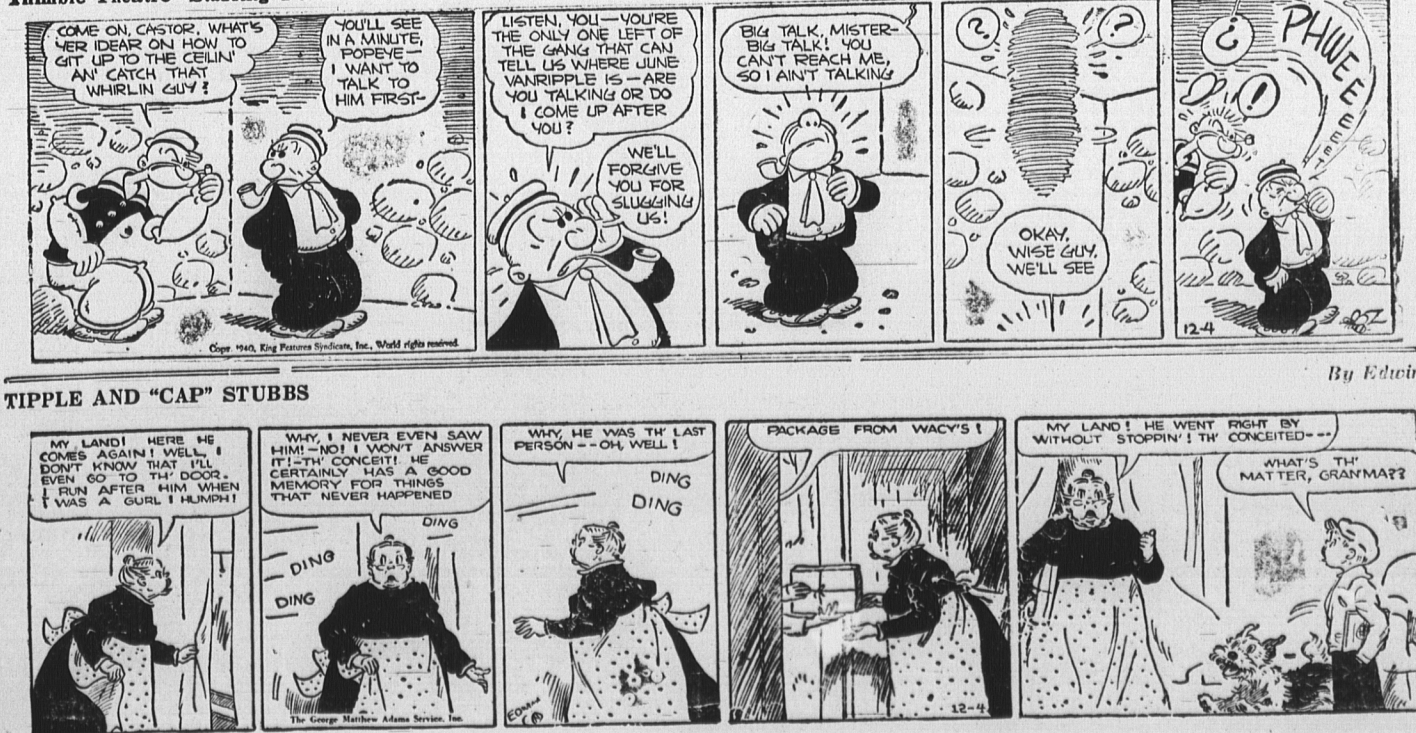
