

## KUROPATKIN IS WITHDRAWING

### His Army Northward From Mukden, Reports Say

### Jap Losses at Liao Yang—Three Armies Unite—Roads Bad—Food Scarce at Mukden

**LITTLE FRESH NEWS.**  
LONDON, Sept. 12.—(Special)—There is no fresh light thrown on situation at the front beyond an approximation of the Japanese casualties in the battle of Liao Yang.

**JAP LOSSES AT LIAO YANG.**  
The losses totalling 17,530, were divided as follows:—In right army under Commander General Kuroki 4,886 men. In centre army commanded by General Nodzu 3,092 and in left army under command of General Oku 7,069.

**WITHDRAWING NORTHWARD.**  
Unofficial reports confirm the statement that Kuropatkin is withdrawing his army northward from Mukden.

**JAP ARMIES UNITE.**  
It is said the three Japanese armies have united their forces.

## CITY COUNCIL IN SESSION

### The Regular Meeting Held Last Night

### No Business of Importance Was Transacted—Notice of By-Law Amendment Was Given.

There was a full Council Meeting last evening. The usual minutes were read and monthly bills agreed to. Communications were read from residents of Upper Prince Street for a light between Alley and Gerald Streets; from Jos. Hughes, Thos. Campbell and Angus DeBoches for extending Douglas Street; from Von Clure Gay asking for a refrigerator in market; from Charlotte-town Light and Power Co asking for permission to install one circuit of 25 lamps of series alternating enclosed arc the same as Halifax and St. John; from Fred Cook asking for a delegate to the union of Canadian Municipalities; from two Electric Companies offering an engineering city electric plan.

A request for the room in Market given to the Antiquarian Society, to be used by the Canadian Historical and Literary Society for meetings once a fortnight was left with the market committee.

The tender of Joseph Hughes for extension Dog's Street, west end, was accepted.

The petition from Prince Street residents for other light matters were placed in the hands of the Light and Power Committee.

The matter of a cellar for Mr. Gay in the market was left to the market committee with power to make arrangements, after some discussion. The request of Poopie Mills for a rebate of fine for selling meat on the streets without a licence was discussed at some length. Couns. Prowse and Riley advocated the enforcement of the law imposing license for selling stock on the streets. Coun. Brown thought those trying market stalls should be protected and Coun. Hooper agreed with this view. After other members had expressed themselves it was moved by Coun. Prowse seconded by Coun. Riley that the matter be left with the market committee. The mayor held the motion was out of order and Coun. Riley gave motion that at next meeting he would introduce amendment to the by-law in accordance with the above resolution.

Applications were granted to Benj. Hozer for asphalt sidewalks in front of his store and to Conolly estate for west side of Queen St.

Coun. Reddin asked if a sidewalk were to be laid on Queen Street in front of John McQuillan's store. Coun. Paton replied that no application had been made. It was ordered that the tenders for the completion of the market basement be called for. Couns. Paton and Brown suggested that the work be left till winter and done by the city, thus given labor when work is scarce. Couns. Paton and Brown voted against the motion. Coun. Brown gave notice of reconsideration at next meeting.

The rates of rental for the Market Hall were fixed as follows—\$25 one night, two nights \$15, third and subsequent nights \$10; for political meetings \$25 a night; two nights \$10, third and subsequent nights \$10. That 50 per cent be paid when Hall is engaged to be forfeited if it is not taken.

Couns. Paton, Brown and Reddin voted against these rates claiming they were too high.

Recorder Hazza d as President invited Mayor and Council to attend the opening of the Exhibition. Coun. Alley claimed that there was discrimination in paying insurance on the new market. The matter of leaving out the companies represented by D. B. Stewart was further discussed and it was agreed that \$2000 more be given. D. B. Stewart and \$1000 to B. O. Callaghan. Council adjourned.

## THE NEW ANGLICAN BISHOP AND THE OLD

In a letter to his clergy and laity the Rt. Rev. Frederick Courtney D. D. S. T. D. Bishop of Nova Scotia tendered his resignation which took effect on April 23rd, 1904 when he had completed his 16 years of Episcopal service. On account of his

candidates were read to the Synod behind closed doors, and an unsuccessful effort was made to have the balloting done in the same way.

The consecration will take place in St. Luke's Cathedral, and a resolution was passed a kinetic Archbishop of Montreal to be present and take part in the consecration exercises but the latter has intimated that it will be impossible for him to be present. The Rev. Clare L. Worrell, M. A. D. C. L., bishop elect of Nova Scotia, is a son of Canon Worrell, of Oakville, Ont. He was born in Smith's Falls, fifty-one years ago. After his college course he entered the profession of teaching, and was principal of the Collegiate Institute of Brockville. In 1881 he entered the Church, and was ordained a priest in 1884. He was situated at Gananoque, Brockville, Morrisburg, Barriefield, and is at present rector of St. Luke's Church, Kingston. He was appointed Archdeacon of Kingston in 1900, and is professor of English in the Royal Military College. He is a man of fine address and presence, and is highly regarded both for his school-

wife's health he had decided to accept the Rectory of St. James Church, New York.

The facts in connection with the selection of a successor are familiar to all our readers. The Synod met August 31st in Halifax to continue its efforts to elect a bishop, rendered futile three months ago by the declining of the Rev. Canon Coty, of Toronto. The names only of two candidates were presented to the Synod on this occasion, those of the Rev. Dr. L. Norman Tucker of Toronto, and the Rev. Archdeacon Clare L. Worrell, of Kingston. After the third ballot, the Synod's choice fell on Archdeacon Worrell, who accepted by telegraph, wiring, "I accept election as the will of God. Ask for Church's prayers. Will write tonight."

The lay delegates were at first strongly in favor of Dr. Tucker. On the first ballot the vote on the lay side stood 67 to 48 in his favor. On the second ballot Archdeacon Worrell gained five laymen and Dr. Tucker lost six, the former coming within five votes of a majority. The third and last ballot secured the election of Archdeacon Worrell by six, the lay vote standing 60 to 54. The clergy, on the other hand, were constantly in Archdeacon Worrell's favor, the first ballot standing 58 to 25, the second 61 to 23, and the third, 61 to 21.
