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PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

In the Legislature on Wednesday evening last, Mr. W. H. Dennis moved the following resolution, seconded by Mr. David Macdonald, in regard to the fisheries. Hon. A. E. Arsenault, seconded by Hon. H. D. McEwen, moved the amendment which appears after the resolution in moving the amendment. Hon. Mr. Arsenault pointed out the weak points in Mr. Dennis' resolution. In regard to the proposal, to establish cold storage plants, he said that that would involve putting fish in cold storage and keeping it in cold storage at freezing temperature from the point of shipment to the point of destination, because fish could not be allowed to thaw and then freeze again. Therefore the whole question depended on the widening of the gauge of the railway and could not be put into operation at the present time. The fourth proposal, namely, to arrange with railway and express companies for special rates for the transportation of fresh fish, he pointed out, had already been done, and it was not original or sensible on the part of the mover to ask for something that already existed. As regards the fifth section of the resolution "to afford more efficient protection to our depleted oyster areas," Mr. Arsenault said he did not see what use protection would be "investigating and devising a remedy for the disease now prevalent among our oysters," this also was a matter that had already been done, and therefore was unnecessary in the resolution.

Hon. H. D. McEwen, in seconding Hon. Mr. Arsenault's amendment, said that the fishermen are next in importance to those of agriculture, and everything that could be done to help that class of the population should be done. In regard to the first section of Mr. Dennis' resolution, Mr. McEwen pointed out that this province was not in the same position as the old countries in Europe, where they have had long-established systems and have been exploiting the fisheries for years and years. We, in this province, he said, had to start for ourselves and find all about our fish, the habitat, etc. The fishing around our shores were abundant, but how to get the best out of them was something we had to learn, and that was just what this Government was doing and had been doing for some time. As regards special transportation for fish, Mr. McEwen said that for the best part of the year, shipping fresh fish to the American market, I know the fishermen last year made a lot of money, because our fish is of a superior quality. None is as good as ours, and the one brings as high a price as the fish from that province. To get proper freight rates is a very important matter, and the Government have done all they can possibly do by refunding part of the express rates to help this matter. As regards instruction, this is an important matter and he required, but his instructors would be required; but he pointed out that the best results may be obtained if we will have to know first of all how the foreign markets will require our fish to be put up. In former days fish was shipped dry. Fresh fish was unknown; but things have changed considerably and we have to come to terms with the conditions, and how to get fresh fish into the market abroad has been a great difficulty, but the car ferry will solve that to a very great extent. I am glad to know that the Government today are seriously considering how best they can help the fishermen to get the most out of their labor. If we can encourage our fishermen so to work that they can get the utmost out of their business, it is something we should aim at, and that is a matter that is seriously engaging the attention of the Fisheries Department at Ottawa. In Boston fish are bought from the most out of the fishermen at six cents a pound with heads off. Those fish are put into pickle-vats for one night, taken out, skinned, cooked, for fifteen minutes in a retort and packed into cans. The skins are put to some use, and the bones are dried and ground and put up in fifty-pound bags and sold as fertilizer, and we have in Prince Edward Island better fish by fifty per cent. When the car ferry is properly established and is in full working order we can establish fish centres in Montreal and cities in the west. But it takes some time and thought and money to work out a plan by which you can get a continuous supply of fish of good quality to put on the market every day. You cannot supply for six months and then say "we cannot supply for the next six months." The supply must be continuous; we will have to have refrigerated cars. It is a big question, and I have no doubt that the same Government which has given us the boon of continuous communication with the mainland will also give the fishermen of the province the very best that can be got in the country.

The resolution and the amendment were as follows:

Mr. Dennis moved, seconded by Mr. D. Macdonald, the following resolution:

WHEREAS the fishing industry of this province is next in importance to agriculture and in the interests of the industry it is desirable that the Federal Government afford the like encouragement and assistance now and heretofore given to agriculture.

THEREFORE RESOLVED that in the opinion of this House the Federal Government be requested and urged:

First, to obtain for the benefit of our fishermen the services of a suitable travelling instructor, to teach the latest and best methods of catching, dressing, curing and preparing fish for market;

Second, to establish short courses in winter at the various fishing centres;

Third, to establish cold storage plants with a view of supplying bait

to the fishermen an enabling fisherman to accumulate a supply of fresh fish and ship the same by the car load to the nearest and best markets;

Fourth, to arrange with railways and express companies for special rates for the transportation of fresh fish to the nearest and best markets;

Fifth, to afford more efficient protection to our depleted oyster areas and to investigate and devise a remedy for the disease now prevalent among our oysters.

Moved in amendment by Hon. Mr. Arsenault, seconded by Hon. Mr. McEwen:

That all the words after the preamble be struck out, and the following be substituted in lieu thereof:

AND WHEREAS, much has already been accomplished by the Department of Fisheries, Ottawa, by its experimenting with brifters to ascertain the habitat of the herring and other fish, in demonstrating the best way of curing and packing herring for market, also in making arrangements with express companies for special rates on car loads of fresh and frozen fish, and in arranging to pay one-third of the express charges on all fresh or salt cured smoked fish on less quantities than car loads with a view to increasing the sale and consumption of fish at inland points;

AND WHEREAS, the question of instruction and technical education for fishermen and the preparation of bulletins along the special lines of industry to fishermen is under the consideration of the officers of the Fisheries Department;

AND WHEREAS, the inauguration of the car ferry and the standardizing of the gauge of the P. E. Island Railway will be a great boon to the fishermen by enabling exporters of fish to ship the same through to the point of destination without transfer or breaking bulk;

THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this House commend the Government of Canada for the action already taken in the premises, and urges such further action be taken as will see to the fishing population of Canada the same measure of encouragement as has been given to the agricultural communities.
