An English paper has a very interesting account of the visit of Princess Marie-Louise to Hartlepool which will be of special interest here as one of her escorts, Major R. H. Poole, D. S. O., O. B. E., is a nephew of Mrs. Artima Lord of this city and grandson of Col. Gray. In continuation of her tour of some of the industrial centres of the North-East Coast, mainly in connection with the furfuran and development of the work of the Y. M. C. A., Princess Marie-Louise visited the Hartlepool. Leaving the Central Marine Engine Works her Highness proceeded to the Heugh Battery, receiving an enthusiastic welcome from the inhabitants of the old borough en route. The sea-scenery here presented could scarcely have been seen under better conditions, the weather being beautifully clear, and the "promenade" bathed in sunshine. Here the party was met by the Aldermen and Councillors of the borough, and Col. L. Robson, C. M. G., D. S. O., explained the part played by the battery on the memorable morning of Dec. 16, 1914. Major R. H. Poole, D. S. O., O. B. E., and Lieut. Fulcher were also presented to her Highness and then came an interesting little function, the Mayor of Hartlepool, on behalf of the Y. M. C. A., asking the Princess acceptance of a piece of German shell, and also a piece of the Zeppelin which was brought down off Hartlepool on Nov. 27, 1916. These were mounted on a carving, depicting the Zeppelin in on fire, and the other the bombardment of the Hartlepool. Her Highness evinced a good deal of interest in these souvenirs, as also did she in a beautifully bound book of bombardment photographs which accompanied the gifts. Her Highness was next conducted round the battery by Major Poole following which she proceeded to the Hartlepool headquarters of the Y. M. C. A. where she found a large and enthusiastic crowd awaiting her. Following the singing of the hymn "For all the saints who from their labours rest," and prayer by the Rev. Wm. Medford, the President extended a hearty welcome to the Princess, and remarked that they were honoured to receive one so closely allied to our beloved King and a daughter of a mother who was identified so largely with almost every Christian charity and philanthropy in the country.
