Soldiers and Farm Labor

The federal scheme for employing operational units in the armed services to relieve the farm labor shortage has fallen through so far as this Province is concerned.

The plan as outlined originally to the provincial governments did not state that a minimum wage rate for all Canada was being fixed.

Every province should be placed in a position to participate in this proposal to employ soldiers on the farms.

It is a good measure now, with the crop year ending and harvest time approaching, it was equally good at seeding time and when the land was being prepared.

What Col. Ralston and Mr. Mitchell have outlined is this. Applications for the help of servicemen will be made to district officers commanding.

The soldier will remain under military discipline and orders while farming, but in other respects will work on the same basis and under the same conditions as the civilians.

The ordinary way of thinking, a much more effective policy would be for the Dominion Government to authorize the Department of Defense to permit soldiers hiring themselves to farmers direct for temporary employment at \$2.00 per day over and above their regular military remuneration.

What we want quickly and speedily is a policy which is within the means of the farmers of this Province. The situation is dire indeed as there is a heavy lay crop to be harvested and the grain crop will soon be ready, followed by the root crop.

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How elections are lost and won in Quebec. Fraudulent registration of 102 non-resident personnel of Hotel Dieu, Pine Avenue hospital, as being eligible to vote in the Cartier by-election of August 9, plus dozens of other cases of padding of the division's electoral lists have been uncovered in a door-to-door canvass of certain parts of the riding by Gazette reporters.

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The Coal Shortage Threat An Ottawa correspondent of the Financial Post comes forward with the cheering statement that, according to the best and most up-to-date view on Canada's 1943-44 coal shortage, it isn't as black as it has been recently painted.

Some considerable further relief is expected by loans and tax concessions shortly to be granted to Canadian miners and by further steps to obtain the use of skilled, able-bodied miners still in the armed forces and who have not been, up to now, willing to return to the mines to help boost domestic production.

This, of course, does not solve the serious transportation problem which Prince Edward Islanders will be up against next winter.

Coal supply is a big factor in this problem and those who obtain their winter coal in advance are taking the only safe course. Unfortunately this system works to the disadvantage of poorer people. It is essential that their interests as well as those of other classes be protected, and it is up to our provincial and federal representatives to impress Ottawa with this fact before it is too late.
