THE S. S. Cacouna arrived in port yesterday at 2.30 p. m. with a cargo of coal. If the weather does not become colder and close up navigation the steamer will be laden with a cargo of general produce for the Newfoundland market.

THE SS Coburn sailed at noon yesterday for St. John's, Newfoundland direct, with a full cargo of general produce and live stock. Her outward cargo from here consists of 10,000 bags oats, 200 bags potatoes, 100 cases eggs, 100 bush vegetables, 500 bush hay and sundry other cargo under deck. On deck she had 315 sheep, 10 head cattle and one horse.

A FINE, new large barn belonging to J. Herman Jones, Pownal, was blown down during the gale Tuesday morning, about 8 o'clock. It was erected on a solid concrete foundation, was all boarded in, the north side of the roof shingled and was a substantial frame. It is now a mass of rotten timber and boards. A stable or racks owned by Angus Beaton of the same place, also suffered a like fate.

THE first number of the promised new Canadian weekly The Canadian Courier is to hand. Its editor is John A. 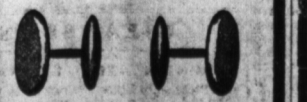
