

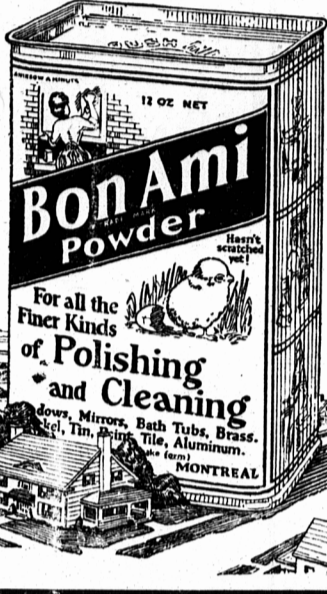

MR. WILLIAM UNDERHAY

Seldom is a community so moved as Miramichi, Bay Fortune and vicinity when on the morning of Tuesday May 25th, 1926 the news that its most loved and honored citizen, Mr. Wm. H. Underhay had departed this life.

Mr. Underhay had been a healthy virile man, and an indefatigable worker until a few weeks ago when becoming somewhat reduced through an attack of La grippe, pneumonia set in, to which he succumbed after two weeks of suffering borne with his characteristic courage and patience.

He was born at Annandale, P. E. I., on Nov. 26th, 1845—the eldest son of the late John C. Underhay M. L. A., and Mrs. Underhay, Whelan Underhay of Bay Fortune, and Fred of Portland, Me., are brothers, and his surviving sisters are Mrs. Montgomery, Port Hill, May Mrs. Sweeney, Boston, Mrs. Geo. Ross, Dugas, Ethel, Mrs. Geo. Walker, Summerside; Miss Lillian, Vancouver, B. C., Miss Ella, Bay Fortune, Mr. Underhay was twice married, first to Miss Emily Leslie who died in 1901, and second to Mrs. Emily (Mrs. John Norton) Annandale in 1909 he married Miss Mabel Mills who predeceased him eight years ago.

The children by this marriage were Fulton, who has just successfully completed his second year in P. W. C. Ernest, Mel and Ethel, all of whom have the sincere sympathy of a large circle of relatives and friends in their sad bereavement.

Mr. Underhay was very widely and favorably known, taking a leading part in enterprises for the good and progress of the community—such as the "Institute," "Egg Circle," Dairying Association, (P. E. I.) Provincial Dairying Association, the kind and good disposition; in the community for his good and valuable services, and in the church, where as an elder and Supt. of the S.S., and as Treas. of the congregation he gave him credit for his unselfish, patient and optimistic display of his own and times were ever an inspiration to all, meriting for him the words "Well done good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of Thy Lord."

The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. E. Lockhart, who spoke of the Underhay presence that had accompanied making him the man of honor and integrity that he was and giving him such courage and peace in the last hour.

Among the floral tributes were a beautiful wreath from the family; a pillow of roses (his favorite flower) from the congregation and a spray from the Sunday school.

He was laid to rest in the Bay Fortune cemetery. The pall bearers being Messrs Edwin McFarlane, George Dixon, James Mills, A. D. McDonald, Wm. C. Fisher, Geo. P. Clapp.

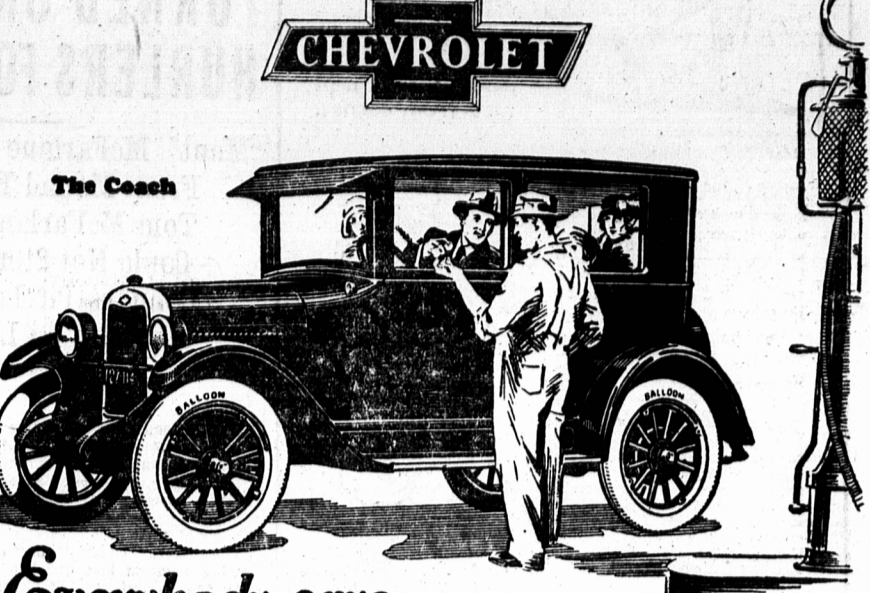
MISS HELEN COLLINS
