Campbell stood directly in front of the window while Alexander ordered the men out. The burglars made a dash for the open window, and the taller one, razor in hand, warned Campbell if he came near him he would eat his throat. Campbell mistook him and the burglar made a dash for liberty. Campbell soon overhauled him and with a well directed blow knocked him down and set on him till help came. Meanwhile Alexander had grappled and overpowered the other marauder. Both were taken to the Police Station where they were to be tried next morning. The capture of these toughs, who gave their names as Murphy and O'Don, was a plucky one by the two young men who were totally unarmed; and the fact that Campbell had undergone two operations for appendicitis within the past year in the P. E. Island Hospital, speaks volumes for that institution.
