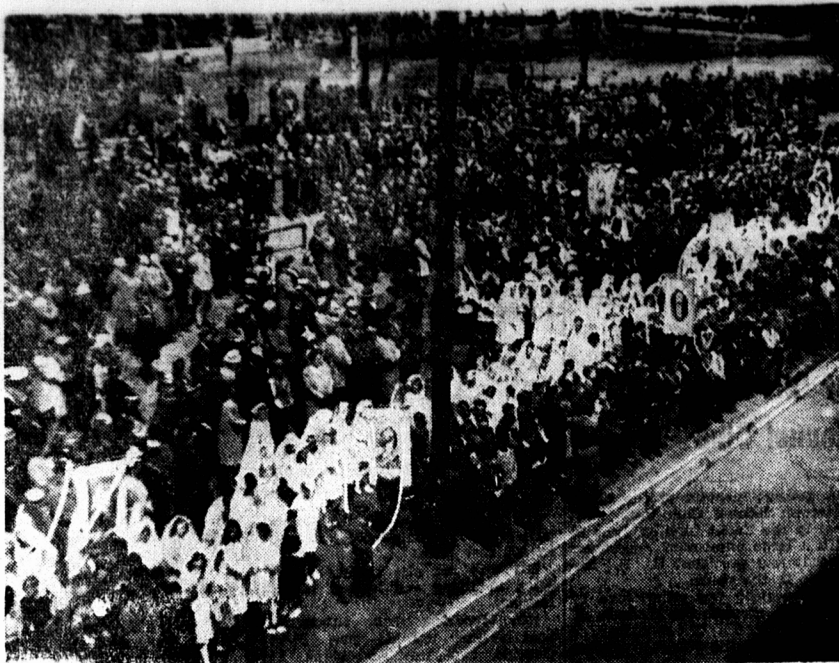

### Lynchings On Increase In Southern States

ATLANTA, Ga., June 9 — (AP)—After a three-year wartime decline in Negro lynchings, each of the post-war years 1946 and 1947 has provided a notorious case to focus international attention on one of the gravest social problems in the Southern States.

The records of Tuskegee Institute, Alabama's Negro school, list three known lynchings in 1946, two in 1944 and one in 1945. The number then jumped to six for last year. There have been no lynchings in Alabama since 1940.

Although the current year to date has not matched in numbers the grim record of 1946 occasioned by the multiple lynching of four Negroes near Monroe, Ga., last July, the recent Greenville, S.C., case culminating in jury acquittal of 28 white men had some aspects unique in southern lynch annals.

It marked the first time that so many persons — 31 defendants in all — had been involved in a mass murder trial for the slaying of a Negro. The case was notable also for speed with which suspects were rounded up and indictments obtained.

Three days after the mutilated body of Willie Earle was found Feb. 17 by a Pickens County (S.C.) roadside, Sheriff R.H. Bearden of Greenville County announced that he had signed admissions from 11 Greenville taxi drivers of taking part in the lynching. Earle had been in jail as a suspect in the fatal stabbing of a taxi driver.

Subsequent arrests brought the total to 21 and they were indicted by a county grand jury about a month later. The trial resulted in a directed verdict of acquittal for three of the defendants and the jury freed the others after a little more than five hours' deliberation.

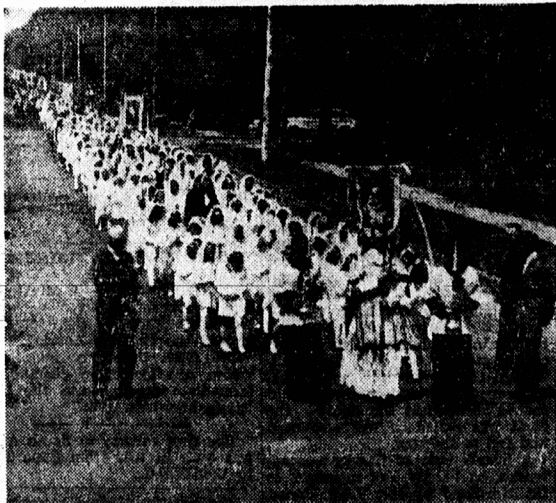

### Crop Outlook On Prairies Improved

OTTAWA, June 11—(CP)—Crop conditions have improved over the Prairie Provinces during the last week with general rains and temperatures rising toward or slightly above normal, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today in the fourth of a series of 16 telegraphic reports covering Prairie conditions.

Crops are generally from 10 days to two weeks later than normal, increasing the hazards of frost damage in the fall, and a period of warmer weather in the immediate future would hasten growth and further improve prospects. Damage from insect pests has not been significant to date. Moisture conditions are considered satisfactory except in the Peace River country, where rain is needed to maintain supplies.

### Georgia Lynching

More savage in execution but fruitless from the standpoint of legal convictions was the Georgia mass lynching in the afternoon of July 25, 1946.

A mob estimated at about 20 white men seized four Negroes — two young men and their wives — from the car of a Walton County farmer and shot them to death in a remote rural section. One of the victims, Roger Malcolm, had been accused of stabbing his white employer and was out on bond. The others were slain presumably because one of the women recognized some members of the mob.

A long state and federal investigation, backed by rewards totaling more than \$30,000, was climaxed in December by a three-week grand jury inquiry. After questioning scores of witnesses who the grand jury reported it was unable to establish the identity of anyone in the mob. There the case rests.

Even before echoes of the Greenville case had died down, North Carolina was confronted with an apparent lynching in the northeastern town of Jackson, N.C., in contrast to the usual pattern of the South's lynch cases, the state of Georgia recently bought James Brown, 25-year-old Negro, to trial on charges of raping a white woman.

The trial was completed in three hours, the jury deliberated three minutes. Brown was convicted and sentenced to die in the electric chair June 17. Mob action threatened at the time of Brown's capture May 6, but he was rushed to safety in the state prison at Reidsville.

### Appointment Of New Provincial Dep'y Secretary

Mr. William MacKinnon, Charlottetown, has been appointed Deputy Provincial Secretary by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, Premier J. Walter Jones announced last night.

Son of the late James A. MacKinnon and Mrs. MacKinnon, he was born in Coleman, Nov. 8, 1923. He graduated from Prince of Wales College in 1942, being valedictorian of his class, and in 1944, graduated with honours from Acadia University where he majored in history. This spring, he graduated in law from Osgoode Hall, Toronto.

He has two sisters, Mrs. W. R. Oulton, Alberton, and Mrs. B. Kenneth Irving, Coleman.

For the past three summers, Mr. MacKinnon worked for the Provincial Government, first with Dr. J. E. Lattimer, of Macdonald College, Que., in preparing an economic survey of the Province. Last summer, at the request of Premier Jones, he prepared a brief for the National Committee of Trade and Tariff, Ottawa.

Premier Jones said last night that he was well pleased with the work done for the Government during that time by Mr. MacKinnon. Pending the return to his duties of Lieut.-Col. C. J. Stewart who is now on sick leave, Mr. MacKinnon, the Premier said, will act as Superintendent of Insurance and will also have charge of the succession duties branch, besides being acting secretary of the Executive Council.

### Pownal Twin Brothers Die Only Week Apart

The funeral of the late Morley Martin Cousins was held yesterday afternoon from the Pownal United Church. The service was conducted by the pastor, the Rev. E. R. McVicar, assisted by the Rev. Sterling Stackhouse, who read Psalms 39 and 116 and led in prayer. The Scripture readings, read by Mr. McVicar, were the 13th chapter of First Corinthians and the 14th chapter of St. John. The hymns sung were "O God Our Help in Ages Past," "Jesus, Saviour, Pilot Me" and "The Lord is My Shepherd."

Mr. McVicar who chose the text of his sermon from the last verse of Second Corinthians, said the occasion was unique in that funeral services for the twin brothers of the deceased had been held in the same church but one week before. He commented on the exemplary Christian character of the deceased, a characteristic which he said, had been shared by both brothers throughout their long Christian experiences.

The pall-bearers were the same as those who had officiated at the brother's burial one week before. They were Earle Jenkins, Shadrack Jardine, John MacMillan, Lloyd Carver, Ernest MacCabe and Clifford Jenkins. Interment was in the Pownal Church Cemetery.
