OUR LOSS OF A MEMBER.

There has been a good deal of discussion as to the probable loss of a member in the Commons as the result of our loss of population, and a contemporary has charged THE GUARDIAN with being "silent" in regard thereto. We have not been silent, nor have we avoided the question, as our readers know. We greatly regret the situation in which the Province is placed. We can ill afford to lose one of the five members which we have been privileged to send to Ottawa. Whether or not we are to lose a member must depend upon our population as determined by the census, and what "is nominated in the bond" of union between the Island and Canada.

We cannot change the facts of the census nor can we change the condition of the bond. Regrets are idle. If there were doubts as to what the terms of union mean in regard to our representation they were settled so far as the Government and Parliament of Canada could settle them when the Island was first deprived of a member by the Redistribution Act of 1882. The same rule as was then applied must now apply, unless we call for a judicial interpretation of the terms of union. Should this be done we very much fear that the Supreme Court of Canada, or the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council would interpret the Act of Union precisely as the Parliament of Canada has always understood it. Still, it might be worth while to raise the point and have it judicially determined.

There will be ample time to consider the question, as we shall retain our present representation until the close of the present Parliament, which is yet four years in the distance. It has been said that Prince Edward Island's case is exceptional in that the original number of members with which she entered the union has been reduced. But our case is little more exceptional than that of New Brunswick which entered the union in 1867 with 15 members, had them first increased to 16, afterwards reduced to 14 and now further to be reduced to 13, or two less than the original number. Nova Scotia had 19 members at first, increased to 21, then lost a member and now stands to lose two more, which will leave that Province with one less had it had in 1867.

IMPORTANT CEREMONY

Corner Stone Of Crapaud Auglican Church.

WAS LAID YESTERDAY

Large Collection was Taken—Brilliant Addresses Delivered.

Great interest was taken yesterday by people of Crapaud in the laying of the corner stone of the new St. John's Church (Anglican). The Steamer Brant arrived at Victoria Wharf at one o'clock, having on board Sir Louis Davies, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and wife, Judge Warburton, Archdeacon Reagh, Premier Farquharson, Horace Hazard Esq. and F. L. Hazard, Esq. The party was met by the Rector, Rev. J. C. R. Cumings, and conveyed by teams to the church grounds where an excellent lunch, served in the most tempting manner by the ladies of the congregation, was partaken of.

At three o'clock a large audience had assembled to witness the ceremonies in connection with the laying of the corner stone. The Archdeacon and the Rector in their robes proceeded with the service, order of which had been printed and distributed among the people.

The platform which had been located on the site of the church tower and was

comfortably seated, was occupied by Sir Louis Davies, Judge Warburton, Judge Fitzgerald, Premier Farquharson, Messrs. F. Hazard and Horace Hazard, Rev. Mr. Robertson, (Pres.), Rev. Mr. Davison (Meh.), Rev. Leo Williams, and Rev. C. Mellor, M. A. The service was said by the Rector, Rev. C. R. Cumings while the stone was laid by Rev. J. B. Reagh, the Venerable Archdeacon T. P. R. Eloquent and appropriate addresses were given by Judge Warburton, Justice Fitzgerald and Sir Louis Davies. Brief remarks were also made by Premier Farquharson, Rev. Mr. Robertson and Rev. Mr. Dawson.

One of the most interesting parts of the service was the placing of contributions upon the newly laid stone. The Rector intimated that he had received \$20 from Hon. Senator Yeo. The Archdeacon placed the first contribution followed by the Rector and the speaker. These three occupying places on the platform and the congregation donated their offerings in turn. The amount thus contributed totalled \$177.

Before the stone was placed in position a tin box properly sealed and containing copies of THE GUARDIAN, Patriotic Examiner and the church paper, also coins of the present day and other articles was deposited by Mr. Chas. Palmer of Victoria.

At the conclusion of the ceremonies tea and refreshments were served by the ladies—resulting in \$75 being netted. The Brant left on return to the City at 4 o'clock.

The church building is now in course of erection, the frame being nearly all up and partly boarded.

The congregation are determined to push forward the work, and hope to have one of the finest country churches to be found on the Island. The Church which is on a plan much similar to that at Milton, is being constructed by Haslam Bros.
