THE KIRK FULFIT

Preaching yesterday morning on the text "They found the man sitting at the feet of Jesus" (Lk. 11:28) the Minister, the Rev. T. H. Russell Somers, said: The descriptions of His followers given by Jesus were sufficiently responsible and illuminating. They were cities set on hills—living above the common levels and conspicuous on every side. They were the salt of the earth—its preservative from corruption and the means of giving it tang and flavour. They were the light of the world. He said, and bade them so let their light shine before men as to cause glory to God. We are brought to Jesus only to discover that we may not linger there but that we become emissaries and inducements to show the great things God has done for us. Those coral islands of the Pacific with their waving palms and rich vegetation have been made by strange little insects, each working at his own tiny purpose. Without their busy, busy, busy and magnificent result. They had nothing in common save an instinct of obedience to God. Each fulfilled his apparently insignificant destiny and the gorgeous island is the result. The people of the Church are strange and varied things. ATTRIBUTES LONG LIFE TO FAITH IN GOD

Death claimed one of Tuelock's oldest residents when Mrs. Mary Arthur Nelson, expired at the age of 101 at a local hospital after an extended illness. Mrs. Nelson was born in Renfrewshire, Scotland in 1842 near Edinburgh Castle. At the age of 11 years she came to America aboard the S. S. Glasgow. The trip lasted 19 days as the crossing was made on the first Screw-type steamer to cross the Atlantic ocean. Upon her arrival in the United States she settled in Ryegate, Vermont, where she married J. B. Nelson and became the mother of her first and only child, Jean Nelson. After the death of her husband she went to California with her daughter and lived in the United States in the Rude colony opposite Youngston Colony on highway 99. Later she moved to Tuelock, California and built her home on what was then a wagon trail and later named Vermont Street by her. Here she lived with her daughter until 1926 when they moved to their present residence Seymour Street. Mrs. Nelson attributes her long life to moderate living and lack of excitement. "God has taken care of me" she always said, "put your trust in Him. I have no recipe for long life except what I find in the Bible." She was an authority on religion and her advice has been sought by many ministers as well as friends. Her daughter Jean is an accomplished musician, well known throughout Tuelock. Mrs. Nelson was a charter member of the Tuelock Presbyterian Church, and services were conducted Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. from J. H. Guy Funeral Chapel. Interment, Tuelock cemetery. Rev. Williams B. Richmond officiating. Mrs. Nelson is a cousin of Mr. W. O. Pyle, Hillsboro Street who with his wife, visited her five years ago in Tuelock, California.
