DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN SUSSEX.

SUSSEX, N.B., Sept. 16.—The brick building occupied in the upper portion as a residence by George W. Fowler, M.P., and containing the stores of Black Bros., clothing, and J. A. Davidson, groceries, was badly damaged by fire which started about two o'clock this morning. The total damage was estimated at \$12,000.

When the fire was discovered the two stores were a mass of flames, and it was only the prompt action of the fire department that saved the centre portion of the town from being wiped out.

Mr Fowler, who owned the building, is at present summering in Rothesay, but he had much valuable furniture, works of art and paintings in the house and these will be badly damaged by smoke and water. Through the good work of the firemen the flames were practically confined to the lower part of the building, still it was necessary to pour large quantities of water on the house.

Black Bros. lost all their stock, which was valued at about \$6,000 and was covered by \$2,500 insurance. Mrs Davidson lost about \$4,000 worth of stock with \$2,500 insurance. The lower part of the building was destroyed to the extent of about \$3,000. Only a short time ago Mr Fowler's
