The last big election of the year at McGill University took place yesterday when the members of the Union decided on their affairs for next year. The nominations are as follows: President, A. A. Young, R. Stewart Science 10, D. Cushing, Law 10, and vice president, M. T. McHenry, W. Henderson Science 10. A good deal of enthusiasm prevailed, and general satisfaction expressed in the choice of the secretary W. G. Irving, who is a native of Vernon River, Bridge, P. E. I.

New Wonderland was crowded for each show last evening. The audience understanding the fact that the bears were still on board the Stanley and that the management had arranged for an amateur performance and picnic contest, turned out in force. They knew when New Wonderland puts on something it is good and they were not disappointed. Amusement to no end was the order last night and the picnic contest was referred by Al Allen to the satisfaction of contestants and audience. In his own act he completely pleased the patrons as on former evenings. Mr. Dillon's song was also a complete success. Taken on the whole the performance last night was another decided success.

One of the largest crowds that have attended a sale for sometime were present at the auction of the Wm. Miller estate at Marshfield yesterday. Leading farmers and citizens from all over the Province were in attendance and buying was brisk. Among those in attendance were P. C. Brown, R. H. Sterns, Hammond Kelly, Chas. Large, W. S. McKie, D. Morrison, Summersidet, Dr. McDonald, Soaris, H. Morris, etc. The farm was held on a reserve bid of \$5500 the highest bidder was John Stewart who bid \$4750. R. H. Sterns bought a general purpose horse sired by Sandy for \$280. D. Morrison, Summersidet the Brazilian trotting mare for \$500. Dr. McDonald, Scuris, the stallion Sandy for \$200, Mr. Love, City, general purpose horse, Sandy's get for \$126 and John Stewart bought Joe Dillon for \$174.50. The other general purpose horses sold from \$150 to \$200.

At Craupud Hall on Saturday evening last the following resolution was submitted for debate. Resolved that confederation with Canada was detrimental to the best interests of this Province. In a very forcible speech Isaac Beer opened the discussion in the affirmative pointing out the many disadvantages under which the Province has labored since she became a member of the union. He was supported in a very able manner by Leslie Adams, Waldron McQuarrie, Dr. Boyver and Thos. McNeil. The negative was upheld by Dr. Houston, who in a clear and clean cut speech, demonstrated beyond a doubt the very many benefits and advantages this Province has participated in through confederation with the great Dominion of Canada. H. B. Arbing, Vernon Moore, J. F. Proffitt, and Rev. R. M. Fenton, supported the Doctor's contention with ringing speeches for the union. At the close of the discussion a vote of the whole audience was taken which resulted in a large majority for the negative. It was one of the finest debates ever held in this up-to-date community.
