#### "Duty Of The Hour."

We wish to warn our readers concerning a circular that our Liberal friends are distributing among the electors of this Province, with the object of arousing religious strife for political advantage. The circular is entitled: "Duty of the Hour," and is quite a lengthy document, judging from the space of time it took Mr. J. J. Hughes to read it at the public meeting at Georgetown on Monday last. We have never seen one of the precious documents, except in Mr. Hughes' hands. No Conservative had any knowledge of its existence until found in the possession of the Liberals. Mr. J. J. Hughes said at the public meeting in question, that Mr. Laughlin McDonald, Liberal Candidate for the Legislature, for the first district of King's, came to Charlottetown, at the instance of his Liberal friends, and had 1000 copies of this document printed at Mitchell Brothers. These were for circulation by the Liberals among the electors of the East Point district. The parcel containing the precious literature seems to have been confiscated, in some way, and their loss so worked upon Mr. Hughes and his friends that he made a clean breast of the whole plot. Our readers will understand from this to what straits the Liberals are reduced. The cause must be in a desperate condition when recourse is had to such tactics. This is no new trick of our Liberal friends; they had already issued a circular of a somewhat similar character early this summer, and this was only a reprint of one handed by their candidates and friends in the election of 1904. This we are prepared to prove. We are informed that no less than 6000 of "Duty of the Hour" have been ordered from the printing establishment of Mitchell Brothers, near the "Patriot stairs". Let our readers, therefore, be on alert and if anyone should present them with one of these precious documents, they will understand that it is the last move of a party reduced to desperation.

The egg market is quiet at seventeen and a half to eighteen and a half cents. Butter was selling at from twenty two to twenty six according to quality.

#### FOR ELECTORAL PURITY.

The success of the movement toward electoral purity is to a large degree dependent upon the arousing of the public mind to a sense of the high dignity and design of the franchise. To this end we may employ various agencies: the press, the law, the pulpit, but not until we view the ballot as a sacred trust and a divine gift will our elections be conducted in a manner worthy of good citizens. A fundamental principle in all democratic forms of government is that of government by representation. The poor man has no opportunity to sit in Parliament, but by power of the franchise he exercises the right of a king and chooses a man to represent him and his cause in the halls of Legislature.

But if for any selfish consideration corrupt practices are resorted to then the true purpose of the ballot is subverted, and the poor man and every other man, no matter how righteous may be their cause, are at the mercy of the holder of a bribe. The cause of Political Reform therefore is one so vital to the interests of all, that no Reform League should have forced upon it the responsibility for its success.

Let every true citizen consider the work of the Moral and Social Reform League, as his own, and in the present crisis so guard the sanctity of the ballot that a true order will be established in which manhood counts for more than money, principle more than party fealty and God's favor more than the favor of men.

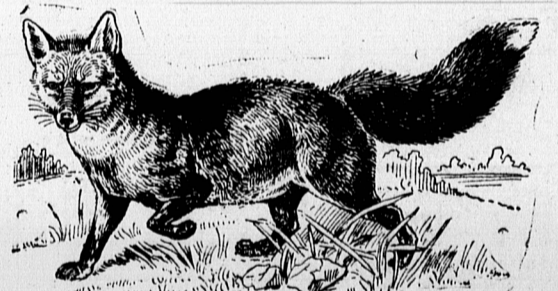
