HALIFAX, May 12--John Ross, a Glace Bay miner, met a tragic death last night. While on his way home he picked up a live wire and received a serious shock, dying almost instantly. He was 17 years of age.

WILL CONNAUGHT SUCCEEDED GREY.

LONDON, May 11--The position in regard to the governor generalship of Canada may be taken to be as follows: It is a fact that King Edward expressed a wish that the Duke of Connaught should be the next governor general, but no appointment has then or has since been made. The question of Earl Grey's successor has, up to the present, not been officially considered.

IN CONNECTION WITH THE SUGGESTED APPOINTMENT, THE FACT MUST BE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION THAT THE PRESENCE OF THE DUKE IN ENGLAND MAY BE DEEMED NECESSARY UNTIL THE DUKE OF CORNWALL, THE KING'S ELDEST SON, IS ABLE TO TAKE PART IN HIGH CEREMONIALS OF STATE.

The Duke of Connaught, who is again spoken of as likely to succeed Earl Grey as Governor General of Canada, is the third son of Queen Victoria. He was born May 1, 1850, and his life has practically been passed in army service. He is a field marshal in rank.

In 1879 he served in Canada at the time of the Fenian raid, and subsequently in Egypt. Then he was commander-in-chief of the forces in Bengal.

Transferred to the important Alder shot command in 1863, he was in charge there when the Ancient and Honorable artillery company of Boston visited there, and showed the visitors great courtesies.

In 1900 he was appointed commander-in-chief for Ireland, where he became unusually popular. At the coronation of King Edward he was made field marshal. He has also been inspector general of the forces.

He is one of the few men who have had the privilege of refusing a throne--the dual crown of Saxo-Coburg-Gotha. He preferred to remain a British soldier, and the place was filled by his nephew, the Duke of Albany.

In 1910 the Duke of Connaught succeeded King Edward as most worshipful grand master of the united grand lodge of Free Masons.
