Prince of Wales "Billing-the-Pig"

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Hundreds of visitors from all over the Midland Countries saw the Prince of Wales compete in the mediaeval game of "Billing-the-pig."

With boyish zest he threw himself into the fun of the fair at a charity fête in the beautiful grounds of Welbeck Abbey, where during his tour of Nottinghamshire and the Serywood Forest, he has been the guest of the Duke and Duchess of Portland.

Today marked the end of the last tour which the Prince will undertake before he leaves for his Canadian ranch. With this in mind people came from far and wide to the fair.

Though heavy showers caused some inconvenience, the Prince made a brief tour of the booths before he left to join the train to King's Cross at Retford.

At one of the booths he was invited to compete for a prize pig in the game of "Billing-the-pig," in which it is the object to set a slightly flattened ball or "wood" through a very small goal.

Laughingly the Prince agreed to try his skill. With the heavy "wood" in his hand, his body poised ready for the throw he carefully sighted the goal, the "wood" which trundled slowly and awkwardly down the twelve yard's pitch, and through the goal.

The people around set up a loud cheer, and the man in charge of the booth said, "Here, have another one Sir."

"No fear," replied the Prince, laughing heartily at his success. "I would have to try for a week before I could get it."

He stayed for some time to watch a clever performance of a group of Boy Scout tumblers from the Y. M. C. A. at Nottingham. Eleven lithe, young figures, dressed in red shirts and pink vests, climbed on to the shoulders of eleven others. Forming into line they did the "two-high" march past giving the Prince "Eyes left" and the right-hand salute which he returned.

To his obvious delight they turned and somersaulted on to human pyramids. Before he left the Prince congratulated the boys, whose ages run from eleven to seventeen years—on their physical condition.

AMERICAN DOLLARS AROUSE BEALIN'S MONEY CHANGERS

BERLIN, Aug. 21.—American tourists are easy prey for the money bootleggers of Berlin whose name today is legion. Every incoming train is met by gentlemen agents who offer to take greenbacks and travelers' checks at higher rates than the government rates. Docks are crowded with money changers, and hotel clerks, waiters, barkeepers and elevator men are soliciting exchange operations.

The difference between the rate which the German government allows banks to pay in marks for American money is so many points less than the rate quoted in New York that middle-men can make a good commission by buying in dollars in small quantities and reselling them to firms which have large quantities of marks they desire to put into money with stable value.

There is a heavy penalty for unauthorized dealing in foreign monies, but the government cannot keep up with such widespread operations. All sorts of firms with a big turnover are forced to seek some means of stabilizing their earnings, and the loss in dealing through legal channels is so great that caution has been thrown to the wind.

At times the number of marks paid for a dollar in New York has been from 25 to 50 percent greater than that paid legally in Germany. This has put a premium on money scalping. Even with the great desire to get rid of paper marks, the demand for marks to facilitate exchange operations has created a shortage of the paper money, and banks are frequently compelled to ration the paper

money and pay out large sums in bills of such small denominations that money-balers would be necessary to compress them into compact enough packages to be carried in anything smaller than suitcases.

Million and half-million-mark bills are promised in a short time, but at present nothing larger than 100,000 mark bills are available, and these are scarce. Even fifty-thousand-mark bills are hard to get at banks.
