CITY AND COUNTRY NEWS.

LEAGUE OF THE CROSS NATAL DAY.—To-day being the feast of St. Aloysius, patron saint of the League of the Cross Temperance Society, the members of that institution attend St. Joseph's Convent at 8 o'clock, a.m., where a high mass will be celebrated by Rev. J. F. Johnson, Spiritual Director of the Society. The sermon which was to be preached in the evening, by Rev. J. C. McMillan will be delivered in the morning as the Rev. Father has to leave the city on business by the afternoon train. In the evening at 8.30 the Society meet in their Hall in regalia and headed by their band, form in procession and march to the Cathedral, parading the principal streets,—where solemn benediction will be sung.
