Some Dominion Immigration Figures

OTTAWA, Sept. 23.—Immigration to Canada for the first four months of the fiscal year ended July 31st, amounted to a total of 40,408 of which 12,217 were British, 6,874 from the United States and 14,517 from other countries. In the same period 12,176 Canadians who had been absent in the United States for six months or over returned to Canada with the intention of making their permanent residence in this country. If the returned Canadians are added to general immigration the total for the four months is 52,778. Immigration for the month of July consisted of 3,122 British, 1,567 from the United States and 3,469 from other countries.

The Grand Circuit Racing Results

COLUMBPS, O., Sept. 21.—Peter Mally, the year's most sensational two-year-old trotter today won the Horse Review Futurity of \$3,500, the feature event of the opening day's programme of the ten day grand circuit meeting. The favorite Dr. Strongworthy took the 2.10 trot in straight heats, although Red Top all but won the first heat. The King stake for 2.07 pacers, raced at three different distances, brought about the defeat of the favorite Theodore Guy, which won third money. The first and third heats went to Phil O'Neill. The 2.18 pace was another split heat event. The well-liked Norman Grattan won the first heat, but was nosed out by Bonnie Watts in the second heat. The third and deciding heat went to Bonnie Watts.

Boy Accuses Man, Of Killing Mother

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—Seven year old Thomas Winkleson, one hand clutching tightly that of a policeman, confronted Frank Malone in the Poplar street police station in Brooklyn and, pointing at the man, exclaimed: "You killed my mamma." Then the youngster burst into tears. The man looked at the lad and then, according to the police said: "What's the use? Sure I did it. I'm sorry, but it's too late now." The boy's cries as he ran from his home brought neighbors and policemen running to the place, where the body of Mrs. Annie Winkleson was found on the floor of the living room with three knife wounds in her abdomen. In another part of the house they found Malone and arrested him on suspicion of knowing something of the death, although he denied it. Questioning by the police failed to move him until the boy's accusation.

France Has Enough Wheat For Needs

PARIS, Sept. 24.—The Mati says that the calculations of all specialists, official and unofficial, agree in placing the French wheat crop and that part of the Algerian crop available, at about 9,500,000 metric tons. The newspaper asserts that as this amount would be more than sufficient to supply the needs of the country, no wheat will have to be imported, except varieties used in the manufacture of specialties, such as very hard wheat for the macaroni markets.

Impressive Service At First Session United Church

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Sept. 23.—Another step marking the progress of the United Church of Canada was taken last night when the Toronto conference of the United Church held its first session the occasion being signalled by a most impressive service in St. James Square Church participated by well over a thousand persons. More than one thousand delegates, representing the former Presbyterian synod of Toronto and a large part of the synod of Kingston the former Toronto Methodist conference and the former Congregational union, gathered at the entrance to the church and then as the choir within rendered the prophetic hymn "The Church's one foundation" three streams of the uniting churches' courts entered separately but once inside, mingled in one throng and on proceeding to their appointed places joined with the congregation in singing.

Hunted For Year, Suspect Captured

MONTREAL, Sept. 24.—George Miller, alias Jack Cleveland, hunted by Quebec and Montreal police for more than a year, in connection with a \$20,000 drug theft at Chicoutimi in September, 1924, was arrested here today by local detectives. He will be taken to Quebec late today for trial. Four men are now in the penitentiary following conviction in the Chicoutimi case. One of them, Philip Farland, an ex-detective, was sentenced to five years.
