Rin Tin Tin The Wonder Dog in "Find Your Man"

"Find Your Man", the feature now showing at the Prince Edward Theatre is one of the few pictures that can be considered above the ordinary. It is excellent entertainment.

The star of the feature must be commended for an unusual display of talent, especially since the hero is none other than Rin Tin Tin, the famous Belgian police dog which was brought over from France some time ago. His acting is so real, that one wonders sometimes whether he is not gifted with human intelligence. He is seen swimming with two people hanging on to his collar for support, scaling tremendous heights, registering love and hate.

A more beautiful setting could not have been chosen. The forest scenes, streams, the river with floating logs, the falls—all those add atmosphere to the kind of background Director Mal St. Clair was trying to create.

MARSHFIELD INSTITUTE

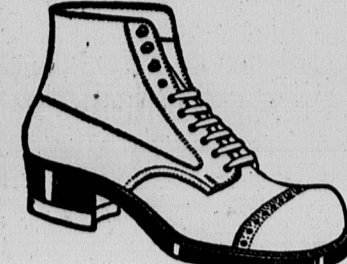

EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest for the 20th Week of the Contest, Ending March 20th, 1925.

There was a slight falling off in the production of the Egg Laying Contest from that of the previous week; practically all of the birds, however, contributed something.

There were only 7 that did not lay during the week. There were 7

birds that laid every day during the week was 604 eggs, total production to date 19,412; this is 778 more eggs than at the same date last year.

Mr. Joseph Carmichael's Barred Rocks led for the week with 55 eggs; Mr. A. Wisner's White Wyandottes were 2nd, with 54 eggs; Mrs. Fred McIntyre's White Leghorns tied with Mr. Sam McPherson's White Leghorns for 3rd place, with 53 eggs each; Mr. Spurgeon Jenkins' Barred Rocks were 4th, with 52 eggs; Mr. Harry Hyde's Barred Rocks were 5th, with 49 eggs; Mr. G. F. Connors' White Leghorns were 6th with 48 eggs; Mr. Charles Parker's Barred Rocks were 7th, with 47 eggs; Mr. W. G. McDonald's Barred Rocks and Mr. Charles McKenna's Barred Rocks and the Experiment-Date Station's pen of Barred Rocks, Mr. Charles McKenna's hen No. 10 for 8th place with 46 eggs; 208 leads the contest in production White Leghorns No. 4 with 95 eggs to date; Mr. Edward Bullpitt's hen No. 4 is 2nd, with 45 eggs; and Mr. Charles McKenna's Barred Rocks were 10th, with 93 eggs.

Mr. G. F. Connors' pen of White Leghorns leads the contest to date with 725 eggs; Mr. Edward Bullpitt's pen No. 4, of second generation White Leghorns is 2nd, with 710 eggs; Mr. Sam McPherson's pen of White Leghorns is 3rd, with 709 eggs; Mr. Edward Bullpitt's pen No. 3 of second generation White Leghorns is 4th, with 670 eggs; Mr. A. Wisner's pen of White Wyandottes of second generation birds is 5th, with 624 eggs; Mr. Joseph Carmichael's Barred Rocks are 6th, with 612 eggs; Mr. Walter Wyandottes of second generation birds is 7th, with 608 eggs; Mr. W. W. Mutch's Barred Rocks are 8th, with 599 eggs; Mr. Charles Parker's Barred Rocks were 9th, with 562 eggs; W. G. McDonald's Barred Rocks and Mr. Charles McKenna's Barred Rocks are 10th, with 536 eggs to date.
